Subject No.13: Proposal for investigation by CBI for inquiring into the irregularities of LoDP Scheme implemented in Karnataka under SCSP and TSP component during 2016-17

- **18.** During the deliberations Shri P.R. Muraleedharan, Member opined that it is better that the Executive Committee of the Board undertake an investigation in the said matter. He also expressed the view that if the Committee so recommends, approval can be given for CBI enquiry. Dr. Biswanath Rath, Member was of the opinion that it is not proper for CBI to enter in CDB and that the Executive Committee of the Board shall investigate on this as a first step. Shri K.K. Ragesh, MP (RS) was of the view that corruption is a criminal offence, and that Board has no right to withhold the CBI enquiry since CBI is already seized of the issue.
- **19.** After detailed discussion, Board approved the proposal and authorized the Secretary, CDB to address CBI, Bengaluru requesting CBI intervention in the matter.

Other Matters

- **23.** Shri K.K. Ragesh MP (RS) brought to the attention of the Board the widespread damage to coconut trees caused in the states of Kerala, Karnataka, Tamilnadu and Andhra Pradesh due to natural calamities. He felt that though some allotment has been given by the CDB to these states towards calamity relief, amount allocated is totally insufficient. After detailed discussion the Board agreed to the suggestion of the Hon'ble MP and authorized the Chairman to identify whether any fund can be set apart for calamity relief through reappropriation. The Chairman was also authorized to allocate maximum possible amount out of the fund so reappropriated to the aforesaid State Governments towards calamity relief.
- **24.** As the present Standing Counsel of CDB Adv. P. Vijayakumar has been appointed as Assistant Solicitor General of India, the Board authorized the Chairman to appoint a new Standing Counsel of the Board from the panel of Central Government Advocates (in place of Adv. P. Vijayakumar).
- **25.** Chairman placed before the Board an action programme as detailed in Annexure II for the perspective development of the coconut sector in India.
- **26.** Board approved the said action programme put forth by the Chairman and authorized the Chairman to submit it to the Ministry with a request to add the same in the Annual Action Plan of the Board from the next financial year.

- **27.** Shri Gagandeep Singh Bedi IAS, Agricultural Production Commissioner & Secretary, Government of Tamilnadu suggested that the Board should come up with a standard protocol with regard to preservatives and preservation of Neera in consultation with CPCRI and other stake holders. He also stated that the State Government is ready to submit a proposal in this regard. Chairman assured him that necessary action will be initiated by the Board soon on receipt of a proposal from the State Government.
- **28.** Shri M.R. Shankara Narayan Reddy, Member informed the Board about White fly (*Rugose Spiralling*) menace being faced by the farmers in the districts of Mandya and Mysore in Karnataka. Chairman assured the member that CDB will take immediate necessary action in the matter.

Annexure II

PROPOSED SCHEMES FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT OF THE COCONUT SECTOR

1. <u>Upgradation of Demonstration cum Seed Production (DSP)</u> Farms to Centre of Excellence

The proposal is for the development of the DSP Farm to a *Centre of Excellence and Farm of International Standards* by demonstrating viable and available technologies on coconut cultivation, processing and value addition. The Centre will serve as a *one stop shop* for knowledge management in coconut, technology transfer, information dissemination and technical assistance. Information on advanced technologies in the areas of cultivation and processing of coconut across the globe would also be demonstrated in collaboration with international institutions. It will be undertaken initially on a pilot scale in one farm and later replicated.

2. <u>Model Village Programme by DSP Farm</u>

DSP Farms will identify a nearby village or an aggregate of 25 hectares of land under coconut as a pilot project, adopt it and develop it as a **Model village** for coconut. The objective is that the farmers in the area are facilitated to undertake sustainable and environment friendly cultivation of coconut adopting all the good agricultural practices in coconut taking into account conservation of all natural resources like soil, water, micro flora in soil etc.

3. Water Conservation in Coconut Gardens

Water conservation will be promoted in coconut gardens, both through individual farmers and farmers organized in Farmer Producer Organizations (FPO). The objective is to *improve the crop water productivity in coconut* through drought management and soil moisture conservation, improving conveyance efficiency of surface irrigation, improving application efficiency of

irrigation through *implementation of micro irrigation systems like drip and* sprinklers, popularizing fertigation, establishing water harvesting structures, construction of ponds in coconut gardens as a source for irrigation and contributing to ground water recharge through seepage of water, construction of ponds etc.

4. Use of non conventional energy in coconut cultivation

This scheme is proposed to *popularize the use of solar technology in coconut cultivation* which offers farmers an opportunity to stabilize their energy costs. Photovoltaic panel systems can harness the sun's *energy to pump water for irrigating crops and powering farm machinery and equipment.* In the long run, farmers can even generate enough power to supply the excess to the electric grid.

5. <u>Promotion of coconut cultivation in North East - Aangan Aangan</u> <u>Mein Nariyal</u>

The scheme is proposed for popularization of coconut in the North Eastern states. Coconut is a crop that has a multitude of uses and provides food security and livelihood security. It is socially and culturally blended with the tradition of the country. Coconut has religious importance too. The scheme *Aangan Aangan Mein Naariyal* proposes to *distribute coconut seedlings to the households* in the district of West Tripura on a pilot basis, at the rate of minimum one seedling per household.

6. <u>Coconut Cultivation in Bastar Region of Chhattisgarh</u>

It is proposed to undertake and promote coconut cultivation in disturbed areas like Bastar region of Chhattisgarh. The objective is to facilitate farmers in cultivation of coconut thereby providing livelihood security and also increasing the area under coconut in non-traditional areas. Coconut cultivation will be promoted in Bastar region as a pilot project and will later be replicated in other such disturbed areas based on the impact.

7. <u>Establishment of Agro Park exclusively for Tender coconut</u> water in Gujarat

Tender coconut water and coconut water is a booming industry world-wide with developed nations like USA and EU importing large amounts of coconut water for use as a sports drink, beverage, refreshing drink etc. It is also used in combination with fruit juices. The tender coconut water processing sector is still in its early stages in India. Taking into account of the vast potential for packed tender coconut water in areas where coconut is not cultivated, especially North India, the scheme is proposed to establish an Agro park exclusively for processing of tender coconut, preferably in Gujarat where coconut is a crop with huge potential.

8. <u>Look North East – Bag of products</u>

The scheme proposes for popularization of processed products of coconut in the North East. A variety of diversified products are possible from coconut and most of which fall in the category of micro, small and medium scale industry for commercial production. Taking into account the nature and extent of coconut cultivation in the North east, trainings could be extended to farmer groups, women and youth for home scale and small scale production of the products. The region shares *international boundaries with four countries* and market promotion could be undertaken in the area as part of *Act East policy* of the Government.

9. Interface with Ayurveda

Traditional medicines in India, especially Ayurveda utilize various coconut products like coconut oil, virgin coconut oil, tender coconut in their medicines and preparations mainly due to the medicinal and nutritional attributes of coconut products known from time immemorial and transferred across generations. It is highly important to bring out these benefits at a time when doctors prescribe avoidance of coconut oil to patients attributing it to the reason for cholesterol and cardiac diseases. It is planned to have an interface

with renowned scientists and doctors in traditional medicine, particularly Ayurveda to bring out and establish the goodness of coconut and its products and popularize it through literature and various media.

10. <u>Research Studies on medicinal and health attributes of coconut</u> products

Coconut has a multitude of benefits, both nutritional and medicinal and has been used since long in traditional medicine in India. In the developed world, conclusive scientific studies are inevitable to establish the medicinal and nutritional attributes of coconut products. The proposal will concentrate on studies on coconut and coconut products in reputed national institutions.

11. Market promotion of coconut products through established retails chains, outlets in airports, railway station and mega malls and through Friends of Coconut Products (FOCP)

It is proposed to initiate focused market promotion programmes for the promotion of coconut products. A four pronged approach is proposed for market development and promotion.

The first approach proposed in through linking with established retail chains in selected metro cities like Aavin in Tamilnadu or Nandini in Karnataka. Potential manufacturers of coconut products like coconut oil, Virgin Coconut oil, desiccated coconut, coconut milk, coconut chips, packed tender coconut water who can regularly supply quality product will be identified and linked with the dairy retail chain outlets. The objective is to popularize the coconut products, ensure a regular supply of coconut products to the consumers through identified retail outlets, online purchase systems and provide market development assistance for the entrepreneurs.

Another approach proposed is through the establishment of coconut outlets in railway stations and airports where there is moving population. The outlets are proposed to be franchisee run and will help in popularizing coconut products among the general public and promoting the goodness and wellness of coconut.

The third approach is through establishment of coconut corners in the existing mega malls. The proposal is to establish the outlets through franchisees based on a MoU. The malls will have heavy traffic and this will provide an opportunity for promotion of the various products and in market development.

The fourth mode is through a team of trained personnel called Friends of Coconut Products (FOCP).

The objective is to promote the various coconut products through a trained group of youth or women Self Help groups. Door to door sales of coconut products could also be undertaken by the groups with infrastructure support. It is also proposed that vans could be provided on lease to women groups for promotion of coconut products in major cities.

12. Consortium of Coconut Producer Companies

CDB has facilitated the formation of a three tier system of Farmer Producer Organizations with Coconut Producer Societies (CPS) at the grass root level, Coconut Producer Federations (CPF) at the intermediate level and Coconut Producer Companies (CPC) at the apex level. CPC are registered under the Indian Companies Act and undertake processing of products. To facilitate efficient production and marketing of the products and to a harmonious functioning of the CPCs, it is proposed to form a national level Consortium of all the CPCs established in India.

13. Impact assessment of CDB schemes since 1981

The scheme is proposed for undertaking an impact assessment of the schemes undertaken by CDB since its establishment in 1981. This will help in having an understanding on the development in the sector as a result of the CDB intervention through the various schemes, the areas that require

attention and the areas to be addressed on a priority basis for ensuring sustainable coconut cultivation. The interventions needed for quality production and certifications of farms could also be undertaken based on need assessment of farmers.

14. IT applications in agriculture

It is proposed for the development of an online communication system which can be operated through the smart phones so that the farmers can easily access information and address his queries. An interactive Farmer App could be developed wherein queries of farmers related to crop cultivation, crop protection, prices etc could be catered to online. The farmers can take photos of his crop and upload so that he could be provided advice on plant protection and nutrition. Online marketing portal could also be integrated to support market development.

15. Periodic refresher trainings for officers of CDB

The proposed scheme is for introduction of a training package for officers of the Board where in periodic refresher trainings will be provided to them through reputed institutions like National Institute of Plant Health Management (NIPHM), National Institute of Agricultural Extension Management [MANAGE], National Institute of Rural development [NIRD], Institute of Rural Management, Anand [IRMA], Institute of Secretariat Training and Management (ISTM), Indian Institute of Management (IIM) etc. The periodic trainings will not only update the officers on the latest advances in technology but will also be motivating and refreshing to take up new challenges for the development of the sector.

16. <u>Safe drinking water for Rural India – National Mission on Safe</u> <u>Drinking Water</u>

The proposal is to explore the potentials of providing safe drinking water to Rural India using activated carbon filters in a Mission mode. Activated carbon is the product from coconut shell which has high export potential and is used in water purification. The principle could be made use of in providing safe drinking water to Rural India in association with other Government agencies in a Mission mode. Promotion of products from coconut shell could also be achieved through this mission since activated carbon is a product from coconut shell. Other products from coconut shell like handicrafts, ice cream cups etc could also be promoted.

17. Laying out of Demonstration units

The proposal is for the establishment of demonstration units which serve as a knowledge house regarding coconut cultivation and processing. The unit will serve to provide insights to entrepreneurs interested in coconut cultivation and processing and also serve to attract the youth to the sector.

18. <u>Beautification of the median in National Highways with dwarf</u> coconut seedlings

Coconut is a crop with high carbon potential and is environment friendly. It contributes to food security, nutritional security and social security. Promoting planting of coconut seedlings along the median in national highways will contribute to the carbon sink, make the city green and the air healthy. Dwarf coconut seedlings will also pose less issues in harvesting of the palms when they grow.

CHAIRMAN'S SPEECH

Chairman CDB chaired the meeting and besides CDB officials senior officials from States of Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland and Tripura attended the meeting.
- **1.3** State level workshop on coconut cultivation and its value addition was organized by Coconut Development Board at Biswa Bangla Convention Centre, New Town Kolkata on 4th November 2018. Chairman and Shri Sampad Ranjan Patra, Director of Agriculture & Ex-officio Secretary, Department of Agriculture, Government of West Bengal attended the workshop.
- **1.4** Coconut Development Board in association with the Hindu in School conducted an Agriculture quiz for students from Chennai, Puducherry, Kancheepuram and Tiruvallur districts of Tamilnadu at SBOA school auditorium Chennai on 9th November 2018. Chairman, Coconut Development Board inaugurated the programme and gave away the prizes to the winners.
- **1.5** State level seminar for the Promotion and Development of Coconut was organized by Coconut Board on 13th November 2018 at Nagercoil, Tamilnadu. Thiru. Pon Radhakrishnan, Hon'ble Minister of State for Finance and Shipping, Government of India inaugurated the programme. Shri S. Mohan Raj, Member, CDB also attended the function.
- **1.6** Coconut Development Board participated in the 38th India International Trade Fair at New Delhi held from 14.11.2018 to 27.11.2018.

- **1.7** Coconut Development Board participated in 10th Edition of Agrovision Exhibition 2018 held at Nagpur Maharashtra organized by Agrovision Foundation, New Delhi during 23-24 November 2018. The function was inaugurated by Shri Radha Mohan Singh, Hon'ble Union Agriculture Minister, Govt. of India in the presence of Shri Yogi Adityanath, Hon'ble Chief Minister of Uttar Pradesh.
- **1.8** To cultivate reading habits among students Coconut Development Board in association with the Hindu distributed free copies of the Hindu in School on 28.11.2018 to thirty two Government schools in the district of Ernakulam, Kerala.
- **1.9** CSIR-Central Food Technological Research Institute (CFTRI), Mysuru in association with Coconut Development Board conducted one-day National Conference on Virgin Coconut Oil (VCO) for Manufacturers at Mysuru on 26.12.2018.
- **1.10** Chairman, Coconut Development Board visited Central Agricultural University (CAU), Imphal, Manipur on 2nd January 2019. Chairman had interaction with Dr. Premjit Singh, Vice Chancellor & Scientists of Central Agricultural University and discussed on the development of a perspective plan for coconut in the North Eastern Region.
- **1.11** Chairman visited NIPHM, Hyderabad on 18th January 2019 and discussed with the Ms. G. Jayalekshmi IAS, Director General and Heads of Divisions of NIPHM on developing training programme for coconut farmers, officials of CDB and designing a protocol for production of quality coconut seedlings in the 11 DSP Farms of CDB.
- **2.** CDB participated in 27 exhibitions and trade fairs conducted in eight States since last Board Meeting.
- **3.** The Board is continuing the training for unemployed youth in coconut palm climbing, harvesting and plant protection activities. A total of 62282 personnel from different States were trained as on 23.01.2019 under this programme. Board has conducted 131 Awareness programmes in scientific cultivation technologies/value addition in coconut across the country.

4. Farmer Collectives

A total of 9691 Coconut Producer Societies (CPSs) and 742 Coconut Producer Federations (CPFs) are registered with CDB from nine states viz. Kerala, Tamilnadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, Maharashtra, Gujarat, Assam and West Bengal

(as on 24.01.2019). So far 67 Coconut Producer Companies (CPCs) have been registered in the country. 13 CPCs from the state of Tamilnadu have registered with CDB so as to enable them to obtain Neera extraction, Processing and marketing license from Government of Tamilnadu in accordance with Tamilnadu Neera Rules 2017 and from the State of Kerala 18 CPCs have been registered with CDB.

5. Export of Coconut Products

- **5.1** The major Coconut Products being exported from the country are coconut shell based activated carbon, coconut oil, fresh coconut, coconut shell charcoal and dry coconut.
- **5.2** The export of coconut products during the year 2018-19 (April to October) was ₹93165.79 lakh.
- **6.** During the year 2018-19 (as on 24.01.2019), 390 new coconut products exporters have registered with the Board. With this, total exporters registered with the Board 3663.

7. Import of Coconut Products

The major products being imported in to the country is coconut oil cake. The import of coconut products during the year 2018-19 (April to October) was ₹32271.49 lakh.

During the current year 2019-20, Government of India sanctioned ₹212.00 crores. Board submitted a proposal for ₹53.00 crores for the first quarter and the same is yet to be released by the Government of India. Coconut Points/Kiosk established

Coconut point is an outlet/kiosk of CPCs established for marketing all kinds of quality products made from coconut. The objective is to establish a retail network of outlets for coconut and coconut based value added products across all the states so as to make the products available throughout the country.

During the year 2018-19, twenty three applications for setting up of coconut points have been received. Inspections of the same have been completed. Admissible financial assistance has been released to three nos. of coconut points. Eligible Financial assistance to the remaining coconut points will be released immediately.

Subject No.4: Export and Import Data of Coconut Products

Export

Export of coconut products excluding coir products during the year 2018-19 (up to February 2019) was valued at Rs.1873.55 crores, which is 16.86% higher than that of the corresponding period of the last year. Major items of export are activated carbon, dried coconut and fresh coconut in terms of value. USA is the largest importer of coconut shell based activated carbon from India, followed by Japan and United Kingdom whereas Afghanistan is the largest importer of dried coconut followed by Pakistan and Iran. Three GCC Countries viz. UAE, Oman and Qatar are the major importers of fresh coconut from India. Contribution of activated carbon alone to the total export is 65.41% whereas dried coconut contributed 9.97%, in terms of value.


Over the last five years, when value of total export of India showed an increasing trend from Rs.19,05,011 crore in 2013-14, to Rs.19,55,541 crore in 2017-18 with a percentage increase of 2.65 as shown in **Table 1**, coconut and coir products recorded increase from Rs.2,632 crore in 2013-14, to Rs.4,296 crore in 2017-18, in terms of value, with a percentage increase of 63.22.


For the quinquennial period from 2013-14 to 2017-18, value of export of coconut and coconut products (except coir) increased from Rs.1156.12 crore to Rs.1764.31 crore with a percentage increase of 52.61 and an annual growth rate of 11.15 **(Table 2)**.

Figure I shows the trend of the export of coconut products from 2013-14 to 2017-18. The trend line indicates increased export during 2018-19. Fresh endocarp and dried endocarp already registered 59.80% and 58.88% increase respectively during the period (April to February) of 2018-19 compared to the corresponding period of the previous year 2017-18 in terms of quantity. Coconut dried and other residues of coconut or copra already registered 29.95% and 19.48% increase respectively during the period (April to February) of 2018-19 compared to the corresponding period of the previous year 2017-18 in terms of quantity. Exported quantity of coconut oil and desiccated coconut decreased by 96.08% and 81.28% respectively over the corresponding period of previous year (April to February) mainly because of the high domestic demand prevailing for these products in the country.

Activated Carbon

Activated Carbon is the major item exported during the year 2018-19 (up to February 2019) and contributed 65.41% to the total value of export during the period under report. Export value of activated carbon recorded an increase of 43.62% over corresponding period of the previous year. USA is the major importer of shell based activated carbon from India, followed by Japan and United Kingdom. From the year 2015-16 export of activated carbon is steadily increasing in terms of both quantity and value.

Dry Coconut

Second major item of export during the year 2018-19 (up to February 2019) is dried coconut which contributed 9.97% of the total export value. Export value of dried coconut recorded an increase of 28.57% over corresponding period of the previous year. Dried coconut is exported in bulk mainly to Afghanistan and Pakistan followed by Iran.

Fresh Coconut

Next major item of export during the year 2018-19 (up to February 2019) is fresh coconut which contributed 8.60% of the total export value. Export value of fresh coconut recorded a decrease of 7.68% over corresponding period of the previous year. Fresh coconut is exported in bulk mainly to UAE and Oman followed by Qatar.

Coconut Oil (Refined)

Coconut oil (refined) contributed around 6.68% to the total export earnings and is mainly exported to UAE, Saudi Arabia and Vietnam. Export value of coconut oil recorded an increase of 1.43% over the previous year.

Item wise export details of all coconut products for the financial year 2018-19 (up to February 2019) is shown in **Annexure I**.


Import

During the year 2018-19 (up to February 2019), Import of coconut products excluding coir products was valued at Rs.535.45 crores, which is 78.30% higher than that of the corresponding period last year.

Graphical representation of import of coconut and coconut products during 2018-19, in terms of value is given in **Figure III**.




The major items of import are oil cake followed by shell charcoal and copra in terms of value. Oil cake alone recorded 60.46% and shell charcoal recorded 14.60% of the total coconut products imported during the year in terms of value because domestic price was ruling much higher than international price from April to February. Copra import was under advance authorization scheme, whereby the imported products are exported after value addition. It is evident from the below table that the domestic copra price during the year 2017-18 and 2018-19 have been ruling over the international price. The average domestic price of copra was much higher than the international price during the period from April to March 2019.


Shell charcoal is the raw material for shell based activated carbon which is the largest exported coconut product from the country. Increase in import of oil cake is mainly attributed to lower international price compared to the domestic market which is evident from **Table 7** and is mainly used for manufacturing cattle feed. Indonesia and Philippines are the largest exporters of copra expeller cake to India.

Horticulture Commissioner, Government of India, Director, Central Plantation Crops Research Institute and Chairman, Coir Board); three Members of Parliament two from Lok Sabha and one from Rajya Sabha; one Member each from the Central Ministries dealing with Revenue and Civil Supplies; one Member each representing the Government of the States of Kerala, Tamilnadu and Karnataka; five Members to represent the State Governments of Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Maharashtra, Odisha, Goa, West Bengal and Union Territories of Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Daman & Diu, Lakshadweep and Puducherry (by rotation); two representatives of the coconut growers from Kerala; one representative each of the coconut growers from Tamilnadu and Karnataka; one Member representing the coconut processing industry and two Members representing the other interests connected with coconut industry.
- 1.2 The term of appointment of the Board Members is three years except that of the ex-officio Members.

Functions of the Board

- 1.3 The following are the main functions of the Board:
 - (i) Adopting measures for the development of coconut industry so that farmers, particularly small farmers, may become participants in and beneficiaries of the development and growth of coconut industry.
 - (ii) Recommending measures for improving the marketing of coconut and its products in India.

- (iii) Imparting technical advice to any person who is engaged in the cultivation of coconut or the processing or the marketing of coconut and its products.
- (iv) Providing financial or other assistance for the development of high yielding coconut hybrids, adoption of improved methods of cultivation of coconut, modern technology for processing of coconut and expansion of area under coconut cultivation (including replanting) with a view to improve the growth of coconut industry.
- (v) Adopting such measures as may be practicable for assisting coconut growers to get incentive prices including recommending as and when necessary, minimum and maximum prices for coconut and its products.
- (vi) Recommending measures for regulating import and export of coconut and its products.
- (vii) Collecting statistics from growers of coconut, dealers in coconut, manufacturers of coconut products and such other persons and institutions as may be prescribed, on any matter relating to coconut industry and publishing the statistics so collected or portions or extracts therefrom.
- (viii) Fixing grades, specifications and standards for coconut and its products.
- (ix) Financing suitable schemes in consultation with the Central Government and the Governments of the States where coconut is grown on a large scale so as to increase the production of coconut and to improve its quality and yield and for this purpose evolving schemes for award of prizes or grant of incentives to growers of coconut and the manufacturers of its products and for providing marketing facilities for coconut and its products.
- (x) Assisting, encouraging, promoting or financing agricultural, technological, industrial or economic research on coconut and its products in such manner as the Board may deem fit by making use of available institutions.
- (xi) Undertaking such publicity and publishing such periodicals, books or bulletins, on the research and development of coconut and its products, as may be found necessary.

- (xii) Setting up of Regional Offices and other agencies for the promotion and development of production, grading and marketing of coconut and its products in coconut growing States and Union Territories for the efficient discharge of the functions and objectives of the Board.
- (xiii) Such other measures as may having regard to the purposes of the Coconut Development Board Act, 1979, be prescribed by the Central Government in consultation with the Governments of the States where coconut is grown on a large scale.
- 1.4 Dr. B.N. Srinivasa Murthy, Horticulture Commissioner, Government of India continued to hold the additional charge of the post of Chairman, Coconut Development Board up to 7.08.2018. Dr. Raju Narayana Swamy IAS took over as full time Chairman on 8.08.2018 and he had been repatriated to his parent department by the Government of India on 7.03.2019. Smt. V. Usha Rani IAS, Director General, National Institute of Agricultural Extension Management, Hyderabad was given additional charge of the post of Chairman and she continued to hold the charge of the post during the period under report.
- 1.5 Shri Saradindu Das, Chief Coconut Development Officer continued in the post during the period under report.
- 1.6 Shri R. Madhu, Secretary continued in the post during the period under report.
- 1.7 As on 31.03.2019 the following positions of the Members of the Board were vacant:
- (i) One Member to represent the Ministry of Central Government dealing with Revenue.
- (ii) One Member to represent the Ministry of Central Government dealing with Civil Supplies and Cooperation.
- (iii) Two Members, one each to represent the Governments of the States of Kerala, and Karnataka.
- (iv) Four Members to represent other State Governments by rotation in the alphabetical order.

Board Meetings

1.8 During the period under report, three Board Meetings were held i.e. 133rd Meeting on 29.06.2018 at Bengaluru, 134th Meeting on 25.10.2018 at Bhubaneswar and 135th Meeting on 30.01.2019 at Chennai respectively.

Functional Committees

- 1.9 The Functional Committees, viz. (1) Executive Committee (2) Research and Development Committee (3) Processing and Marketing Committee and (4) Publicity Committee were reconstituted in pursuance of clause 3 of the Coconut Development Board Regulations, 1982 in the 135th Meeting of the Board held on 30.01.2019 at Chennai.
- 1.10 During the period under report two Meetings of the Functional Committees were held as detailed below:
- (i) 23rd Meeting of the Processing and Marketing Committee on 29.06.2018.
- (ii) 27th Meeting of the Publicity Committee on 29.06.2018.
- 1.11 The list of Members of the Board and that of the Functional Committees are given in **Annexure I to V.**

Organizational Structure

1.12 To implement various projects of the Board and to coordinate and monitor the developmental programmes on coconut in different regions, Coconut Development Board has established Regional Offices, State Centres and Demonstration-cum-Seed Production (DSP) Farms in different parts of the country. During the period under report four Regional Offices, five State Centres and ten DSP Farms were functioning in different parts of the country. The Market Development cum Information Centre at Delhi and the Field Office at Thiruvananthapuram continued to function during the period under report. The Organizational Chart of the Board is given in **Annexure VI**.

Regional Offices

1.13 The Regional Offices of the Coconut Development Board continued to function from Bengaluru in Karnataka, Guwahati in Assam, Chennai in Tamilnadu and Patna in Bihar during the period under report.

(i) Regional Office, Bengaluru

- 1.14 The Regional Office, Bengaluru, which has been established in 1982-83, looks after the activities of the Board in the States of Karnataka and Goa in coordination with the Department of Horticulture in Karnataka and Department of Agriculture in Goa besides directly implementing the following Schemes:
 - (a) Aid to Registered/Approved/Private Coconut Nurseries and Seed Gardens.
 - (b) Integrated Farming for Productivity Improvement: The Regional Office is directly implementing the "Laying out of Demonstration Plots" on a cluster basis in selected locations in Karnataka. Each cluster is a compact area of not less than 25 hectare.
 - (c) Expansion of Area under Coconut in the States of Karnataka and Goa.
 - (d) In addition to the above, a Parasite Breeding Laboratory has also been set up in the Regional Office to combat the menace of coconut leaf eating caterpillar in the State under the Technology Mission on Coconut (TMOC). Similarly, a Quality Testing Laboratory (QTL) attached to the Regional Office has also been functioning under TMOC.
- 1.15 The quarterly Journal "Bharatiya Thengu Patrika" in Kannada is being published regularly from Regional Office Bangalore in addition to book-lets and leaf lets on scientific coconut cultivation, guidelines on the implementation of various schemes of the Board and various aspects on product diversification and by-product utilization of coconut in regional language. Under Market intelligence, the Regional Office, regularly collects statistics from coconut growers, dealers in coconut, manufacturers of coconut products, Agricultural Produce Market Committees of the respective states and institutions who are dealing with the marketing of coconut products industry, compile the data and publishing the statistics so collected in the Board's publications.
- 1.16 The State Centre at Thane (Maharashtra) and DSP Farms at Mandya (Karnataka) and Palghar (Maharashtra) are functioning under the administrative control of this Regional Office, Bengaluru. The Regional Office regularly undertakes extension and market promotional activities by participating in exhibitions,

conducting seminars and workshops on various aspects of coconut cultivation and industry in the various States under its jurisdiction. It also imparts technical guidance and advice to the farmers and others connected with coconut industry.

(ii) Regional Office, Guwahati

- 1.17 As per the orders of the Department of Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare, Government of India vide Order No.4-46/2006-Hort.II dated 22.07.2008 the Regional Office, Patna was restructured and converted into a State Centre and the Regional Office of the Board for North and North-East started functioning from the Board's State Centre office at Guwahati from 6.03.2009.
- 1.18 The State Centres located at Kolkata (West Bengal) and Pitapally (Odisha) are functioning under the administrative control of this Regional Office.
- 1.19 The Demonstration cum Seed Production Farms located at Abhayapuri (Assam), Pitapally (Odisha) and Hichachara (Tripura) are also functioning under the control of this Regional Office. In addition to monitoring the activities of the State Centres, Regional Office Guwahati is also directly implementing the Board's schemes in Assam and also in other States in the North-Eastern region where the Board does not have any State Centres. Regional Office Guwahati is also regularly participating in various exhibitions, melas, fairs, seminars, etc. in the State of Assam and also imparts technical guidance and advice to the farmers and others connected with coconut industry.
- 1.20 A Training Centre for coconut based convenience foods was set up in the Regional Office, Guwahati under the Technology Mission on Coconut. During the period under report the Centre imparted training to 97 individuals in ten batches.

(iii) Regional Office, Chennai

1.21 The Regional Office, Chennai which established in 1995-96 is looking after the integrated development of coconut in the State of Tamilnadu and Union Territories of Puducherry and Andaman & Nicobar Islands. The State Centres at Vijayawada (Telangana) and Port Blair (A&N Islands) and the DSP Farms at Vegiwada (Andhra Pradesh) and Dhali (Tamilnadu) function under the administrative control of this

Regional Office. The Regional Office is directly implementing the following Schemes in Tamilnadu apart from coordinating the implementation of the CDB Schemes through the Department of Agriculture/ Horticulture in the respective States/Union Territories:

- (a) Aid to Registered/Approved/Private Coconut Nurseries and Seed Gardens.
- (b) Laying out of Demonstration Plots on a cluster basis in selected locations in Tamilnadu. Each cluster is a compact area of not less than 25 hectare.
- 1.22 The Regional Office is directly implementing the scheme, 'Expansion of Area under Coconut' in Tamilnadu and Union Territory of Puducherry with the assistance of the State Governments concerned.

(iv) Regional Office, Patna

1.23 The Regional Office, Patna was initially established during the year 1985-86. As per the orders of the Department of Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare, Government of India vide Order No.4-46/2006-Hort.II dated 22.07.2008 the Regional Office, Patna was restructured and converted into a State Centre and the Regional Office of the Board for North and North-East started functioning from the Board's State Centre office at Guwahati from 6.03.2009. Thereafter, the Department of Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare, Government of India, vide Office Memo No.4-10/2014-Hort.II dated 13.08.2014, constituted a Central Team under the Chairmanship of Dr. S.K. Malhotra, former Horticulture Commissioner, Government of India to explore the possibilities of reopening the Regional Office of the Board in Patna, Bihar and the Team submitted its report on 1.09.2014. As recommended by the Central Team, the Department of Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare, Government of India vide letter No.4-10/2014-Hort.II dated 4.05.2016, the State Centre office of the Board at Patna was converted into Regional Office with Deputy Director as the head of office and the existing staff. The Regional Office, Patna is looking after the implementation of the Board's programmes in the States of Bihar, Jharkhand and Chhattisgarh.

1.24 The Demonstration cum Seed Production Farms located in Madhepura (Bihar) and Kondagaon (Chhattisgarh) are also functioning under the control of this Regional Office.

State Centres

- 1.25 The Board has set up its State Centres in major coconut growing traditional/non-traditional States for the effective implementation and monitoring of its schemes besides looking after the post harvest management and marketing issues. These State Centres are located at:
 - (i) Vijayawada in Andhra Pradesh
 - (ii) Kolkata in West Bengal
 - (iii) Pitapally in Odisha
 - (iv) Port Blair in Andaman & Nicobar Islands
 - (v) Thane in Maharashtra
- 1.26 The State Centres look after the implementation of the Board's Schemes in the States where these offices are located. They also closely monitor the Board's Schemes implemented by the respective State Governments and keep close liaison with the State Agriculture/Horticulture Departments. The State Centres are regularly participating in exhibitions, fairs, melas and seminars and also impart technical guidance and advice to the farmers and others connected with coconut industry. The State Centres also regularly collect market intelligence reports and prices of various coconut products and send them periodically to the Headquarters for its compilation/publication.
- 1.27 The State Centres in Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Odisha and West Bengal are directly implementing the scheme "Laying out of Demonstration Plots" in the respective States to educate scientific management of coconut gardens to improve the production and productivity of coconut and demonstrate the coconut based farming systems to increase the income from the unit area. The scheme is implemented on a farmer participatory mode in compact areas of economically viable sizes.

Market Development cum Information Centre, Delhi

1.28 The Market Development cum Information Centre in Delhi was set up with a view to undertake market intelligence and market promotional activities and thereby improve the consumption and utilization of coconut and coconut products in the North and North-West region of the country. The Centre also keeps close liaison with various Ministries to expedite policy matters and other works in connection with implementation and monitoring of Board's activities. The centre regularly undertakes market development activities, surveys and Market Information Service in these Regions besides participating in Exhibitions, Melas, Seminars, etc. and also collects various statistics on coconut and coconut products from important markets in Delhi.

Demonstration cum Seed Production (DSP) Farms

- 1.29 Demonstration-cum-Seed Production (DSP) Farms were established in different parts of the country with the objective of demonstrating the scientific cultivation of coconut to the farmers and also to produce quality planting material. At present the Board has ten DSP Farms located at:
 - (i) Abhayapuri (Assam)
 - (ii) Kondagaon (Chhattisgarh)
 - (iii) Madhepura (Bihar)
 - (iv) Mandya (Karnataka)
 - (v) Neriamangalam (Kerala)
 - (vi) Pitapally (Odisha)
 - (vii) Vegiwada (Andhra Pradesh)
 - (viii) Palghar (Maharashtra)
 - (ix) Dhali (Tamilnadu)
 - (x) Hichachara (Tripura)
 - (xi) Fulia (West Bengal)
- 1.30 Details about the functioning and performance of these DSP Farms are given in **Chapter 3**.

Field Office, Thiruvananthapuram

1.31 The Field Office at Thiruvananthapuram was set up with a view to have constant liaison with the Government of Kerala for the successful implementation of the Board's schemes in the State with particular emphasis to the pilot scheme "Replanting and Rejuvenation of Coconut Gardens" sanctioned by the Government of India for implementation in the districts of Thiruvananthapuram, Kollam and Thrissur. The centre also conducts the training programmes of 'Friends of Coconut Tree' and formation of Coconut Producers Societies in the district.

Internal Audit

1.32 An Internal Audit wing is functioning in the Board with an Audit Officer for regular internal auditing of the Board, particularly the field units i.e. Regional Offices, Bengaluru, Guwahati, Chennai, Patna and all the State Centers, all DSP Farms and other Centres.

Engagement of apprentices in the Board as per the Apprentices Act, 1961

1.33 In terms of the Apprentices Act, 1961, thirteen trade apprentices underwent apprenticeship training in Coconut Development Board, Headquarters, Kochi and DSP Farm, Neriamangalam during the year under report. The apprenticeship training was given in the trades of Programming and Systems Administration Assistant (PASAA), Stenographer (English) and Horticulture Assistant. Out of the 13 apprentices, 4 apprentices completed their apprenticeship training during 2018-19.

1.34 Coconut Development Board thus played an active role in the Skill Development Initiatives of Government of India in spite of limited facilities available for the apprenticeship training.

Complaints received by the Internal Complaints Committee constituted in terms of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013

1.35 Internal Complaints Committees have been constituted in the Board's Headquarters, Kochi, Regional Office, Bengaluru and Chennai, and State Centre and

- DSP Farm, Pitapally in terms of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013.
- 1.36 The above Internal Complaints Committees did not receive any complaint of sexual harassment during the year under report.
- 1.37 As far as other offices of the Board are concerned, these offices do not have sufficient number of staff to constitute the Internal Complaints Committee. Hence, complaints if any, received from woman employees of such offices will be attended by the Local Complaints Committee constituted in the District concerned under Section 6 of the Act. However, no complaint of sexual harassment was received from these offices during the year 2018-19.

2. DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES (2018-19) - AN OVER VIEW

- 2.1 An amount of ₹19577.34 lakh was utilized by the Board for implementation of various schemes during the period under report. Additional fund of ₹8200 lakh received from the Government of India to mitigate the losses caused to coconut sector due to Gaja Cyclone in Tamilnadu under special package was also released. In addition to this, an expenditure of ₹117.50 lakh was incurred for meeting the recurring operational expenditure, commercial coconut nursery expenses of the 11 DSP Farms, which was met from the accumulated receipts of the Board.
- 2.2 The following programmes were implemented by the Board during the period under report:

- b) Organic Manure Units

- A5. Marketing, Market Intelligence Services, Statistics and strengthening of Export Promotion Council (EPC)
- A6. Publicity, Extension Activities and Information Technology
- A7. Technical Service and Project Management
- B. Technology Mission on Coconut
- C. Replanting and Rejuvenation of old Coconut Gardens
- D. Coconut Palm Insurance Scheme
- E. Kera Suraksha Insurance Scheme
- F. Establishment of Centre of Excellence in Coconut

- 2.3 The highlights of the achievements during the period under report are:
 - A total financial assistance of ₹12346.13 lakh has been extended to the States of Tamilnadu, Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka and Kerala to mitigate the losses caused to the coconut sector due to natural calamities including a special package of ₹9200.16 lakh related to Gaja cyclone hit Tamilnadu during the year 2018-19.
 - Under the scheme 'Laying out of Demonstration Plots (LoDP)', the efficacy of scientific management of coconut palms and coconut based farming systems was demonstrated in new area of 13173.54 hectares and maintenance area of 26734.54 hectares by extending financial assistance of ₹6341.97 lakh.
 - Under LoDP, 2984.96 hectares new area and maintenance area of 25219.22
 hectares was implemented directly by the Board on cluster basis with farmer
 participation benefiting small and marginal farmers in the States of Kerala,
 Karnataka, Tamilnadu, Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, Maharashtra, West Bengal,
 Gujarat, Chhattisgarh and Assam.
 - The LoDP direct implementation both 1st and 2nd year programme of the Board in eight States of Kerala, Karnataka, Tamilnadu, Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, West Bengal, Gujarat and Assam was mainly facilitated by Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) in coconut viz. Coconut Producer Societies (CPSs)/Coconut Producer Federations (CPFs) registered with the Board. Out of 777 clusters involved in the programme, 762 were CPSs/CPFs from these States.
 - LoDP programme was also implemented through the State Agriculture/ Horticulture Departments of the States of Kerala, Karnataka, Tamilnadu, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Odisha, Maharashtra, West Bengal, Goa, Gujarat, Chhattisgarh, Assam, Tripura, Nagaland, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, Mizoram and Manipur and Union Territories of Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Puducherry and Lakshadweep covering 10188.58 hectares of new area and maintenance area of 1515.32 hectares with total financial assistance of ₹2045.59 lakh.

- During the year, with financial support of ₹65.04 lakh, the Board has assisted
 establishment of 172 Organic Manure Units (87 directly by the Board and
 85 through State Governments) with an annual production potential of about
 9000 MT organic manure.
- Under the scheme 'Area Expansion Programme', an area of 2189.76 hectare was additionally brought under coconut cultivation by extending financial assistance of ₹163.17 lakh benefiting 3685 farmers.
- Financial assistance of ₹116.80 lakh was provided under the scheme 'Establishment of Regional Coconut Nurseries (RCN)' for production of 7.30 lakh quality planting material by strengthening the departmental nurseries of various States, which in turn will cater to the requirement of new planting of coconut to an estimated area of about 4500 hectares.
- Three elite seed gardens and 7 coconut nurseries were newly established under private sector with the financial assistance of ₹24.55 lakh from the Board. On attaining the stabilized yield the seed gardens will become a permanent and reliable source of seednuts.
- In the Board's DSP Farms a total of 288249 seedlings was raised and 772089 seednuts sown during the year. A total revenue of ₹285.01 lakh was realized from the coconut seedlings and other farm produces from the 11 DSP Farms of the Board.
- As part of Krishi Kalyan Abhiyan under the Aspirational Districts Programme, a total of 83000 coconut seedlings were distributed to 16600 landed families (@ 5 seedlings each) in 18 Aspirational Districts in 9 States. A total expenditure of ₹45.73 lakh was incurred by the Board under the programme which included organizing Field Days also.
- Expert Committees constituted to visit the DSP Farms of the Board, study the
 problems and suggest wholesome recommendations for overall development of
 Farms have submitted the reports.
- 2.4 A summary of the budget allocation and expenditure during 2018-19 is given in **Table 1**. The State wise and Scheme wise physical and financial target and achievements are given in **Annexure VII**.

3. PRODUCTION AND PRODUCTIVITY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMMES

1. Production and Distribution of Quality Planting Material

A. Demonstration-cum-Seed Production Farms for Coconut

3.1 The Board is maintaining eleven Demonstration-cum-Seed Production (DSP) Farms with the objective of producing quality coconut seedlings of Tall, Dwarf and Hybrid of different parental combinations suited for different agro-climatic conditions. These Farms also serve as demonstration centres for scientific coconut cultivation. The 20 ha DSP Farm at Mandya (Karnataka) is the first Farm established by the Board. The other Farms are established at Abhayapuri (Assam), Madhepura (Bihar), Kondagaon (Chhattisgarh), Neriamangalam (Kerala), Vegiwada (Andhra Pradesh), Pitapally (Odisha), Palghar (Maharashtra), Dhali (Tamilnadu), Hichachara (Tripura) and Fulia (West Bengal) during different periods up to 2018. The basic details of the DSP Farms are shown below:

3.2 As per EFC approved programme, the expenditure on DSP Farms shall be fully supported from the budget of the Board up to ₹27.00 lakh for maintenance of each DSP Farm. Expenditure incurred over and above the budgetary limit is met from the Receipts of the Board.

- 3.3 For proper monitoring of the Farms, performance indicators have been fixed for various activities. The targets fixed under the various components vis-à-vis the achievements are shown in **Table 2**. The total expenditure incurred under the DSP Farms of the Board during the year under report was ₹330.43 lakh of which ₹212.93 lakh was met from the budget and ₹117.50 lakh was met from receipts of the Board.
- 3.4 The Governments of West Bengal and Gujarat were being pursued for allocation of land for establishment of one DSP Farm each in the respective States. The Government of West Bengal has allocated 50 acres of land within District Seed Farm, Fulia, Nadia District, West Bengal for establishment of new DSP Farm by the Board, for a period of 33 years. Handing over and taking up of land was done during May 2018. The developmental activities have been initiated by formal taking over of the land during 2018-19.

(i) DSP Farm, Mandya (Karnataka)

- 3.5 This is the first Farm established by the Board in 1982 in an area of 20 ha. It is situated 10 km away from Mandya town and 45 km from Mysore, the Palace City and 110 km from Bengaluru, the Garden City and the capital city of Karnataka. The soil is red sandy loam with Murrum gravel, which is well suited for coconut cultivation.
- 3.6 The total palm population in the Farm is 4081 of which 3200 are yielding. The major cultivars planted are Tiptur Tall (899), West Coast Tall (199), Tamilnadu Tall (138), Laccadive Ordinary (66), Benaulim Tall (106), Chowghat Orange Dwarf (1170), Malayan Yellow Dwarf (161), Chowghat Green Dwarf (297), Malayan Orange Dwarf (149), Hybrid (308) and other varieties including Exotics (120).
- 3.7 During the year under report, a total of 181321 coconuts were harvested, which includes 94931 tall, 42279 dwarf, 3770 exotic, 31114 hybrid and 9227 hybridized nuts. The hybridized nuts were harvested from 2220 inflorescences emasculated during previous year. Under hybridization programme 5295 inflorescences were emasculated and pollinated.
- 3.8 A Commercial Nursery is being maintained at the Farm for production of coconut seedlings of different released varieties/cultivars. During the year under

- report 53737 coconut seedlings (10790 tall, 38604 dwarf and 4343 hybrid) were certified. A total of 81504 seednuts (44077 tall, 29079 dwarf, 2158 exotic and 6190 hybrid) were sown during the year under report.
- 3.9 The Demonstration Plots set up in the Farm to promote multi species cropping in coconut to enhance the net return from the unit area were maintained well with crop combinations of (a) coconut, cocoa, nutmeg, pepper, mango, guava and (b) coconut and cocoa.
- 3.10 A parasite breeding laboratory is being maintained for the management of leaf eating caterpillar infestation in the Farm and also for sale under LoDP and farmers. During the year under report, 1023675 parasites were produced and supplied to LoDP clusters and also for further multiplication in the lab.
- 3.11 Under Extension Activities, Farm participated in the Flower Show cum Exhibition at Mandya in November 2018 organized by the Department of Horticulture, Government of Karnataka.
- 3.12 The Farm has conducted 5 batches of "Friends of Coconut Tree" training programme at DSP Farm, Mandya and invited resource speakers' to deliver lectures on various aspects from Department of Horticulture, University of Agricultural Science, V.C. Farm, Mandya, Union Bank of India, LIC, Hospitals etc. and arranged inaugural and valedictory functions. The Farm provided technical support to the visitors like students of Agriculture Universities and farmers who visited the farm. A study programme was organized in the farm for the Diploma in Agricultural Science/ B.Sc students of University of Agricultural Sciences, V.C Farm, Mandya. Subscriptions were collected for Indian Coconut Journal (English) - 19 Nos., Bharathiya Tengu Pathrike (Kannada) - 118 Nos., Bharatiya Nariyal Patrike (Hindi) -2 Nos., Indian Nalikera Journal (Malayalam) - 1 No. and Indhia Thennai Idhazh (Tamil) - 1 No. from the farmers/visitors those who visited the farm. The vermi compost production and earth worm production were also undertaken in the farm. In order to improve the soil and water conservation a coconut waste shredder machine was purchased and mulching materials from coconut waste are being made for mulching coconut basin.

- 3.13 During the year under report an amount of ₹53.11 lakh was realized as receipts, out of which ₹31.88 lakh was from the sale of seedlings and ₹21.22 lakh from farm produce.
- 3.14 The expenditure incurred during the year under report was ₹64.87 lakh of which ₹27.00 lakh was met from the budget and ₹37.87 lakh was met from the receipts of the Board.

(ii) DSP Farm, Abhayapuri (Assam)

- 3.15 The 40 ha Farm, established during 1986-87 is located at Batabari Village in Bongaigaon District, about 3.5 km away from Abhayapuri town and 200 km from Guwahati, the State capital.
- 3.16 The total palm population is 3812, of which 2570 palms are bearing. During the period under report a total of 98995 mature and tender coconuts were harvested which include 51069 tall, 22246 dwarf, 23888 hybrid, 263 hybridized and 1529 tender coconuts.
- 3.17 During the year under report 96397 seed nuts were sown (own source -27863, outside -68534) in the commercial nursery attached to the Farm. A total of 30785 quality seedlings (tall 26434, dwarf 4203 and hybrid 148) were certified.
- 3.18 About 29.70 tons of vermi compost was produced and applied to the coconut palms and intercrops of the Farm.
- 3.19 Extension activities undertaken during the year include celebration of Hindi fortnight, Krishi Kalyan Abhiyan in 4 Districts, participation in Block Level Awareness Programme and FoCT training programme.
- 3.20 The receipts realized was ₹25.86 lakh out of which ₹15.68 lakh was from the sale of seedlings and ₹10.18 lakh from intercrops such as turmeric, fish, pepper, arecanut, mature/tender coconut, seed nut etc.
- 3.21 During the year under report an amount of ₹16.43 lakh was incurred for various recurring and non recurring expenses which was met from the budget.

(iii) DSP Farm, Madhepura (Bihar)

- 3.22 The DSP Farm at Singheshwar in Madhepura District of Bihar was established during 1987 in an area of 40 ha. The Farm is situated 7 km away from the District Headquarters, Madhepura and 300 km from the State Capital, Patna.
- 3.23 The total annual rainfall recorded during the year was 3504 mm with 52 rainy days. Maximum temperature of 39°C and minimum temperature of 6.38°C were recorded in the Farm during the year.
- 3.24 The present palm population in the Farm is 3400 out of which 3049 palms are yielding. During the period under report 5954 nuts were harvested.
- 3.25 Various perennial horticulture crops like litchi, mango, sapota, guava, pomegranate etc. are being maintained in addition to the cultivation of other intercrops like turmeric, elephant foot yam, mustard, pea, green gram, etc.
- 3.26 Under the commercial nursery attached to the Farm 17000 tall seednuts were procured.
- 3.27 Under the extension activities Farm distributed seedlings in Pradhan Mantri Samridhi Yojna and also through Department of Horticulture.
- 3.28 A total amount of ₹10.73 lakh was realized as receipts during the year including ₹4.71 lakh from the sale of seedlings and ₹6.01 lakh from harvested nuts, intercrops etc.
- 3.29 The expenditure incurred during the year under report was ₹6.35 lakh which was fully met from the budget.

(iv) DSP Farm, Kondagaon (Chhattisgarh)

- 3.30 The DSP Farm in Kondagaon in Chhattisgarh in a total area of 40 ha was established during 1988 with a view to produce quality coconut seedlings suited for the area as well as to promote scientific coconut farming through demonstration of the production and processing technology. The Farm is situated 3 km away from Kondagaon town, 80 km from Jagdalpur and 225 km from Raipur, the State capital of Chhattisgarh.
- 3.31 The existing palm population in the Farm is 5906 and at present 4028 palms are yielding. A total of 105472 nuts were harvested (tall -72273, dwarf -13070, hybrid -

- 16374, and exotic 3755) of which 24550 mature coconuts were selected as seed nuts from the identified mother palms in the Farm and sown in the nursery.
- 3.32 During the period under report 35550 seed nuts (own source 24550, outside source 11000) were sown in the commercial nursery attached to the Farm and a total of 36640 seedlings (tall 34801, dwarf 1631, hybrid 208) were certified. Under the hybridization programme 150 hybridized seed nuts were harvested.
- 3.33 Various perennial/mixed crops such as mango, lemon, litchi, amla, coffee, jackfruit, cashew, cinnamon, black pepper, cocoa and other seasonal intercrops like turmeric, pineapple, etc. were maintained in the Farm.
- 3.34 As part of extension activities farmers' training programme, FoCT training and participation in various exhibitions in the locality were undertaken.
- 3.35 A total amount of ₹41.86 lakh was realized as receipts during the year including ₹29.27 lakh from the sale of seedlings and ₹12.58 lakh from coconuts, intercrops, etc.
- 3.36 The expenditure incurred during the year under report was ₹15.75 lakh which was fully met from the budget.

(v) DSP Farm, Neriamangalam (Kerala)

- 3.37 This Farm was established in 1991 in the 20 hectare land provided by the Government of Kerala on long lease basis. It is situated 70 km away from Kochi. The river 'Periyar', one of the biggest perennial rivers in Kerala is flowing along the northern boundary of the Farm.
- 3.38 A total of 2037 coconut palms were planted in an area of 13.326 ha. Present palm population is 1727 of which 1207 are in yielding stage. The inter-se block of WCT, CGD and COD planted by CPCRI during 1997 inside the Farm, for hybridization programme to evolve disease resistant hybrid parental combination was also maintained during the period under report.
- 3.39 During the period under report, the Farm recorded a harvest of 63884 nuts which includes tall/exotic 38089, hybrid 2315 and dwarf 18666 and 4814 hybridized nuts. Under hybridization programme 4814 DxT hybridized seed nuts were harvested and sown in the nursery.

- 3.40 The perennial crops planted in the Farm were maintained well. The important crops among them are rambutan (22), nutmeg (51), pepper (101), cocoa (381), cashew graft (211), mango (4), jack (5), mangosteen (9) and arecanut (50).
- 3.41 During the year under report 30738 seedlings comprising of tall 4164, dwarf 21354 and 5220 hybrid/NCD quality seedlings of different varieties were produced in the coconut nursery being maintained in the Farm. 43240 dwarf seed coconuts were procured from outside source and a total of 126681 seednuts of different cultivars (71339 tall, 46932 dwarf and 8410 DxT hybridized nuts) were sown in the nursery.
- 3.42 Two organic manure units were maintained with a total production of 1130 kg good quality vermi compost which was applied to the coconut palms and intercrops.
- 3.43 Under the extension activities, 12 on-job trainings were conducted on 'Nursery Management and Hybridization' for Kerala Vocational Higher Secondary Education (VHSE) (Agri.) students from various schools in Ernakulam District. Three one-day training programmes for farmers under ATMA and farmers group visits were also coordinated.
- 3.44 An amount of ₹40.87 lakh was realized as receipts during the year, out of which ₹23.93 lakh from the sale of seedlings and ₹16.93 lakh from coconuts, inter/mixed crops, other farm produces and miscellaneous items.
- 3.45 The expenditure incurred during the year under report was ₹35 lakh, of which ₹27 lakh was met from the budget and ₹8 lakh from the receipts of the Board.

(vi) DSP Farm, Vegiwada (Andhra Pradesh)

- 3.46 The Farm established in 1994-95 in an area of 71.80 ha at Vegiwada in West Godavari District is situated about 23 km away from Eluru town. However the cultivable area extends to 40 ha only. The Farm has a population of 3991coconut palms of different cultivars (3335 palms are currently yielding) and intercrops like cocoa (3150), cashew (210), custard apple (55), amla (28), guava (18) etc.
- 3.47 During the year a total of 396215 coconuts (tall 278599, dwarf 117616) were harvested from 3335 yielding palms with an average yield of 118.81 nuts per palm. Of which 144537 seednuts (tall 105721, dwarf 38816) were sown in the nursery. A

total of 78678 seedlings were certified comprising of tall - 51534, dwarf - 24478 and hybrid - 2666.

- 3.48 During the year 70 tons of vermi compost was also produced in the Farm.
- 3.49 An amount of ₹53.59 lakh was realized as receipts during the year, of which ₹39.10 lakh from the sale of seedlings, ₹14.48 lakh from farm produce.
- 3.50 The total expenditure incurred during the year was ₹25.23 lakh which was fully met from the budget.

(vii) DSP Farm, Pitapally (Odisha)

- 3.51 The 40 ha Farm established in 1999 is situated on the side of NH-5 between Khurda and Bhubaneswar and 5 km away from Khurda town and 20 km away from the capital city of Bhubaneswar.
- 3.52 The farmland is gentle sloppy terrain with lateritic murrum soil. The soil pH ranges from 4.5 to 6.5 with very poor organic matter. The temperature in the Farm location ranges from 9°C to 49°C, annual fall of 1400-1900 mm with average annual Relative Humidity of 70%.
- 3.53 Total area brought under coconut planting is about 33.80 ha. The present palm population is 3844 comprising of 2122 tall, 1505 dwarf and 217 hybrids and 2973 are in yielding stage. During the period under report 67389 nuts were harvested. The perennial intercrops like mango, guava, sapota, cashew and other seasonal intercrops were also maintained in the Farm.
- 3.54 During the year, 105 ton vermi compost was produced and utilized in the Farm itself. A total of 40470 seed nuts from outside sources were sown in the nursery and produced 9899 (tall 5787, dwarf 4112) seedlings.
- 3.55 An amount of ₹21.06 lakh was realized as receipts during the year, of which ₹4.55 lakh from the sale of seedlings and ₹16.51 lakh from seednuts, intercrops and book adjustment.
- 3.56 The total expenditure incurred during the year under report was ₹73.87 lakh of which ₹27 lakh was met from the budget and ₹46.87 lakh from the receipts of the Board.

(vii) DSP Farm, Palghar (Maharashtra)

- 3.57 The Farm established in January 2013 is situated 120 km away from the State Headquarters, Mumbai. The predominant soil of the area is black cotton and is slightly acidic (pH from 6.00 to 6.98). During the year under report, 4919 mm rainfall, average maximum temperature of 34.52°C and minimum of 18.77°C were recorded in the Farm.
- 3.58 The 40 hectare land is divided into 21 plots to accommodate 80% dwarf cultivars and 20% tall and germplasm collection. About 90% of the seedlings were planted during 2013-14. Planting in plots No.20 (Calangute) and 21 (Germplasm-partial) were taken up during 2015-16.
- 3.59 In the commercial nursery attached to the Farm, 24322 seedlings (tall 11137, dwarf 11196 and NCD 1989) were produced and 10000 tall seed nuts were sown.
- 3.60 The total receipts realized during the year was ₹24.45 lakh of which ₹23.91 lakh was from the sale of seedlings and ₹0.54 lakh from farm produce and miscellaneous items.
- 3.61 The expenditure incurred during the year under report was ₹22.09 lakh which was fully met from the budget.
- 3.62 Extension activities undertaken during the year under report include observance of World Coconut Day and Hindi Day in September 2018.

(ix) DSP Farm, Dhali (Tamilnadu)

- 3.63 The Farm established in 2014 is situated 21 km away from Udumalpet town and 2 km from Thirumoorthy dam. The total area of the Farm is 102 acres of which 65 acres was taken over by the Board in 2014-15 and the balance of 37 acres in 2016-17 from the Department of Agriculture, Government of Tamilnadu, on lease basis for 33 years.
- 3.64 The Farm area is in the coconut belt of Tamilnadu with conducive agro climatic condition suited for coconut cultivation. Farm is having different soil types viz. sandy loam and lateritic, which is well suited for coconut cultivation. The rainfall recorded during the year was 422 mm in 32 rainy days. High level canal of Parambikulam-Aliyar Project is flowing nearby the Farm.

- 3.65 As per the approved layout, the Farm is divided into 16 blocks. Planting of seedlings in 13 blocks was completed up to 2017-18 with a total of 3886 seedlings of different varieties viz. Chowghat Orange Dwarf (1140), Chowghat Green Dwarf (384), Malaysian Orange Dwarf (350), Malaysian Green Dwarf (1129), Malaysian Yellow Dwarf (358), West Coast Tall (152), Ganga Bondam (300), Tiptur Tall (246) and Hybrids (120). During the year 2018-19, 60 nos. of Tiptur Tall were planted.
- 3.66 During the year, 100000 seednuts were sown (80000 tall and 20000 dwarf) and 6846 tall seedlings certified in the commercial nursery being maintained in the Farm.
- 3.67 Drip irrigation is installed in all planted blocks except in block no.5 utilizing the available water from the existing six bore wells. In addition advance amount is deposited with CPWD for identification, drilling and commissioning of two bore wells in the farm.
- 3.68 Advance of ₹11.66 lakh has been deposited with CPWD for conversion of existing CFL/Fluorescent light fittings with energy efficient LED/solar light fittings.
- 3.69 The total receipts realized during the year under report was ₹5.40 lakh (₹5.16 from sale of coconut seedlings and ₹0.23 lakh from other farm produces).
- 3.70 The expenditure incurred during the year under report was ₹51.75 lakh of which ₹27 lakh was met from the budget and ₹24.75 lakh from the receipts of the Board.

(x) DSP Farm, Hichachara (Tripura)

- 3.71 The DSP Farm established in an area of 22 ha was taken over by the Board on 6th February 2016. Land development, fencing and repairing of the existing buildings at Farm campus were taken up during the year under report.
- 3.72 In the commercial nursery attached to the Farm a total of 39950 seednuts were sown and 16604 seedlings were certified (tall 16307 and hybrid 297) during the year under report.
- 3.73 The total receipts realized during the year under report was $\stackrel{?}{\sim} 8.05$ lakh ($\stackrel{?}{\sim} 8.03$ from sale of coconut seedlings and $\stackrel{?}{\sim} 0.02$ lakh from other farm produces).
- 3.74 The expenditure incurred during the year under report was ₹10.99 lakh which was fully met from the budget.

(xi) DSP Farm, Fulia (West Bengal)

- 3.75 During the period under report a new DSP Farm has been established in Fulia District of West Bengal. The farm is established in 50 acres of land within the District Seed Farm, Fulia, Nadia District, West Bengal.
- 3.76 The farm has been established with a special thrust in regard to the supply of quality coconut planting material for expansion of area and taking up of demonstrative cultivation of coconut with suitable intercrops to increase profitability.
- 3.77 During the year under report 80000 tall seednuts were procured and sown in the nursery.
- 3.78 The expenditure incurred during the year under report was 8.09 lakh which was met from the budget.

Coconut Nurseries attached to DSP Farms

3.79 The programme is being implemented taking into consideration the increasing demand for quality coconut seedlings all over the country. During the period under report a total of 772089 seed nuts of different cultivars were sown in the DSP Farms of the Board as detailed in **Table 3**.

- 3.81 The Nurseries were maintained with the infrastructure facilities available in the respective Farms. An amount of ₹172.51 lakh was incurred for the nursery related activities during the year under report, which was met from the receipts of the Board. An amount of ₹186.26 lakh was realized as receipts from the sale of seedlings during the year under report.
- 3.82 The fund utilized from the Grant-in-aid received and the receipts of the Board and the income realized thereto by the DSP Farms and the Coconut Nurseries are shown in **Table 5**.

(b) Establishment of Regional Coconut Nurseries

3.83 The objective of the scheme is to supplement the nursery programme of the State Governments. The production target fixed under the scheme during the period under report was 10 lakh seedlings with a total financial outlay of ₹160 lakh. The State wise target fixed and achievement made is shown in **Table 6**.

(d) Establishment of Nucleus Coconut Seed Garden

- 3.84 The objective of the scheme is to establish Coconut Seed Gardens of known parentage of elite planting material for large scale production of seedlings of promising hybrid combinations/cultivars under private sector. During the period under report, financial assistance to a tune of ₹16.50 lakh was extended for establishment of three new seed gardens and maintenance of five gardens.
- 3.85 An amount of ₹3 lakh was released to one unit in Karnataka for establishment of one unit and ₹1.50 lakh towards 2^{nd} instalment, ₹4.50 lakh for 3^{rd} instalment. An amount of ₹6 lakh was released to Tamilnadu for two new units and ₹1.50 lakh for 2^{nd} instalment to one unit.

(e) Establishment of Small Coconut Nursery

3.86 The objective of the scheme is to establish small coconut nursery for elite planting material. During the period under report 7 new nurseries were established and second instalment of subsidy was released to 9 units.

3.87 An amount of ₹3.25 lakh was released towards the first instalment of subsidy to 7 new units and ₹4.80 lakh towards the second instalment for 9 units in Kerala, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh and West Bengal, making a total of ₹8.05 lakh. The Statewise target and achievement made is shown.

2. Expansion of Area under Coconut

3.88 The objective of the programme is to bring in more area under coconut in the potential belts thereby increasing the production potential in the country. For this, the small and marginal farmers are given incentive assistance for undertaking new planting of coconut and its further maintenance. As per the revised guidelines of MIDH, financial assistance under the scheme is 25% of the cost which comes to ₹6500 per ha for tall variety of seedlings, ₹6750 per ha for hybrid and ₹7500 per ha for dwarf variety of seedlings in Normal area and ₹13750 per ha for tall and hybrid and ₹15000 per ha for dwarf variety of seedlings in Scheduled and Hilly areas, which is disbursed in two equal annual instalments.

3.89 During the period under report, against the target of 1280 hectares, a total area of 2189.76 hectares covering 3685 farmers was brought additionally under fresh planting in 14 States and 2 Union Territories. An amount of ₹163.17 lakh was disbursed of which ₹77.132 lakh was spent for first year subsidy and ₹86.028 lakh for maintenance subsidy. The State/Union Territory wise achievements are shown in **Table 9 and 10**.

3. Integrated Farming for Productivity Improvement

3.90 The objective of the scheme is to improve the production and productivity of coconut holdings through an integrated approach and thereby enhancing the rate of returns from unit holdings. The component programmes sanctioned by the Government of India are the following:

- (i) Laying out of Demonstration Plots
- (ii) Organic Manure Units

(i) Laying out of Demonstration Plots

3.91 The objective of the scheme is to demonstrate the impact of scientific management of coconut gardens to the farmers as farmer's participatory demonstration plots by providing financial assistance @ ₹35000 per hectare in two annual instalments. During the period under report 13173.54 hectares new area was brought under demonstration and 26734.54 ha maintained by extending financial

assistance to the tune of ₹6222.87 lakh. The State-wise target fixed and the achievement made during the period under report is given in **Table 11** and the details of implementation through State Governments as well as directly by the Board are given in **Table 12**.

(ii) Organic Manure Units

- 3.92 The scheme is intended to promote the organic recycling in coconut holdings to improve the physical properties of soil, enhance the nutrient status and increase the water holding capacity of the soil in coconut gardens. As per the revised guidelines of MIDH, financial assistance is 100% cost limited to maximum of ₹60000 per unit. Maximum subsidy is given for unit of 1200 cubic feet volume with shed of convenient size. Proportionate subsidy is given for smaller units, minimum being 150 cubic feet volume.
- 3.93 During the period under report the target fixed under the scheme was to establish 262 organic manure units with a total financial outlay of ₹104.80 lakh. Against this target, 172 units were established by extending financial assistance of ₹65.44 lakh. The State wise target fixed and achievement made during the year under report is given in **Table 13**.

4. Direct Implementation of LODP scheme by the Board through FPOs

- 3.94 The Board started direct implementation of the scheme "Laying out of Demonstration Plots (LODP)" through clusters during 2005. As the Board started formation of Farmer Producer Organizations (FPOs) in coconut sector in 2011-12, direct implementation of LODP scheme facilitated by the FPOs registered with the Board was initiated in Kerala in 2012-13 itself.
- 3.95 Implementation of the scheme facilitated by the coconut FPOs was further extended to Karnataka, Tamilnadu and Andhra Pradesh in 2013-14, Odisha and West Bengal in 2014-15, and Assam and Gujarat in 2015-16.
- 3.96 During the period under report, Board implemented the programme directly facilitated by 777 selected CPSs/clusters. Out of these, 762 were Coconut Producer Societies (CPSs)/Coconut Producer Federations (CPFs) already registered with the

Board. Direct implementation of the scheme was entirely through FPOs in the States of Kerala, Tamilnadu, Andhra Pradesh, Odisha, West Bengal and Gujarat. In Assam out of the 16 clusters for second year LODP direct implementation, 14 were FPOs and 2 were clusters. In Tamilnadu, out of 26 clusters for second year LODP direct implementation, 5 were clusters. In Maharashtra (first & second) and Chhattisgarh (second), LODP implementation was entirely through clusters. During the period under report, 2984.96 hectare area was covered under first year LODP and 25219.22 ha under second year LODP directly reaching to 77950 farmers covering 4619137 palms all over India. The details of direct implementation of the programme under cluster approach are shown in **Table 14**.

4. Technology Demonstration and Quality Testing Laboratory

- 3.97 The objective of the 'Technology Demonstration' programme is to promote the over all development and growth of the coconut based industries in the country. The component programmes are:
 - a) Organizing training programmes on coconut based convenience foods.
 - b) Training programme on post harvest coconut processing.
 - c) Process demonstration and training on coconut vinegar from matured coconut water using slow process and minimal processing of tender coconut etc.

Technology Demonstration and Training Programmes in Coconut Processing

3.98 The Board imparts training to farmers, entrepreneurs, Kudumbasree Units/Self Help Groups on coconut kernel based convenience foods and coconut water based vinegar.

Training Programmes

- 3.99 The objectives of the training programme are
 - to focus on the scope and potential for the production of coconut convenience foods,
 - to impart training skills, entrepreneurial development, leadership qualities and project management skills to the entrepreneurs,
 - to familiarize the participants about quality control operations and quality management systems being followed in food processing industries and
 - to provide information on various packaging systems for preservation of coconut convenience foods.

Training on coconut based convenience foods

- 3.100 During the period under report CDB Institute of Technology (CIT) conducted 59 batches of various training programmes on coconut based convenience foods. Under this programme, 796 individuals were trained.
- 3.101 Regional Office, Guwahati conducted 10 batches training programmes on coconut based convenience foods. Under this programme, 90 individuals were trained. The trainees were selected by the Coconut Producer Societies and NGOs.

3.102 During the period under report 886 individuals were imparted training in 68 batches under six training programmes and the details are furnished below:

Technological Research

- 3.103 Under the scheme "Technology Mission on Coconut (TMoC)", CIT has undertaken a research project on 'Comparative study on quantitative and qualitative aspects of neera from different varieties of coconut (5 varieties)' at DSP Farm, Neriamangalam.
- 3.104 CIT is also involved in the processing and supply of neera and coconut based value added products like neera sugar, neera jaggery, neera cookies, neera chocolate, neera spread, neera spicy jaggery, neera halwa, neera honey, coconut chunks, flavoured coconut milk, coconut cookies, coconut chips, coconut halwa, coconut lemonade, coconut chocolate, tender coconut ice cream, coconut vinegar etc. CIT has also supplied anti-fermenting solution to various CPFs/CPCs to harvest 15000 litres of neera from coconut Inflorescence.

New Product Development

- 3.105 CIT has ventured into product development to improve value addition in coconut. The following value added coconut products were developed by CIT:
 - Coconut Wafers incorporating coconut residue
 - Rice coconut papad, coconut wraps (plain, spicy & chocolate), cake incorporating copra meal.
 - Preservation of fresh coconut kernel for culinary purpose under ambient condition.
 - Coconut chunks and coconut haustorium candy.

Transfer of Technologies to Entrepreneurs

3.106 Technology for coconut milk preservation and packing was transferred to Sakthi Coco Products, Pollachi, Tamilnadu on 21.02.2019 at a total fee of ₹59,000/-(including GST). Process demonstration and training was provided to the entrepreneur as part of technology transfer process.

Quality Testing Laboratory

3.107 Quality Testing Laboratory functioning in CIT, Vazhakulam is a NABL accredited lab in chemical and biological testing as per ISO/IEC 17025:2005 and is continuing its NABL accreditation since September 2012. The analytical works carried out by the Chemical and Microbiology Sections are as follows:

Chemical Section

- 3.108 Samples of various coconut products like coconut oil, virgin coconut oil, copra oil cake soap, copra meal chocolate, coconut kernal, neera, desiccated coconut, nata life, coconut wafer, vinegar, neem cake, ground nut cake, bone meal powder, dolomite rock phosphate, chaulmoogra oil, coconut flour, coconut paste, palm oil, apple concentrate, sweet rice bran oil, gingelly oil, tender coconut water, coconut sugar, other coconut based convenience foods etc. were analyzed for chemical parameters.
- 3.109 During the year under report, the chemical lab had analyzed a total of 509 coconut product samples covering 2514 chemical parameters.

Microbiology Section

- 3.110 Samples of various coconut products like coconut milk, coconut oil, copra, coconut kernel, tender coconut water, neera syrup, neera semi solid jaggery, roasted coconut, coconut paste, virgin coconut oil, desiccated coconut, matured coconut water and coconut convenience foods were analyzed for microbiological parameters.
- 3.111 During the year under report, microbiology lab had analyzed a total of 162 coconut product samples covering a total of 565 parameters.

A5. Replanting and Rejuvenation of old Coconut Gardens

- 3.116 The main objective of the scheme 'Replanting and Rejuvenation of old Coconut Gardens' is to enhance the production and productivity of coconut by the removal of disease advanced, old, senile and unproductive palms, replanting with quality seedlings and rejuvenation of the remaining palms in a Mission mode by adoption of integrated management practices.
- 3.117 Implementation of the scheme was continued in Kerala, Karnataka, Tamilnadu, Andhra Pradesh and Goa during 2018-19. The scheme was also extended for implementation in the North Eastern States of Assam, Tripura, Nagaland and Mizoram during the year 2018-19. Though allocations were made for Odisha and Meghalaya could not implement the scheme during the year. Further the fund released for the States of Odisha, Puducherry and UT of Lakshadweep for the year 2017-18 was revalidated for utilization during 2018-19. An amount of ₹6779.11 lakh has been incurred against target of ₹3951.22 lakh allotted for implementing various components of the scheme. The higher release of funds was mainly for the coconut related activities in the flood/cyclone/drought hit areas of the States of Tamilnadu, Kerala, Karnataka and Andhra Pradesh.

Kerala

3.118 An amount of ₹973.25 lakh was envisaged under the scheme for implementation in 1600 ha. Accordingly, Government of Kerala issued administrative approval for the project proposal to implement the scheme and based on the State level sanction, an amount of ₹631 lakh for 1079 ha was released to Government of Kerala during the period under report. Government of Kerala also requested additional requirement for 1117 ha and issued administrative approval for the project proposal to implement the scheme. Based on the State level sanction and availability of funds an amount of ₹499.858 lakh was released for 1117 ha to Government of Kerala during the period under report.

Karnataka

3.119 An amount of ₹1061.288 lakh was allocated under the scheme in 1785 ha in Karnataka. Based on the administrative approval, State level sanction and the project proposal a total amount of ₹1061.288 lakh was released to the State to cover a fresh area of 1785 ha and 3000 ha of maintenance area. The request of the State Government for additional target of 447 ha was also considered during the year and based on the State level sanction and availability of funds an amount of ₹200.033 lakh was also released additionally during the period under report.

Tamilnadu

- 3.120 During 2018-19, the Government of Tamilnadu had accorded administrative approval for implementation of the scheme in the targeted area of 1089 ha and based on the project an amount of ₹1060.769 lakh was released to Government of Tamilnadu. Based on the request from the State Government additional amount of ₹1342.50 lakh for covering 3000 ha was also released to state Government during the period under report.
- 3.121 A Special Package of ₹9200 lakh to Government of Tamilnadu to mitigate losses by Gaja Cyclone during 2018-19 was released to the State of Tamilnadu under the Centrally sponsored scheme on 'Mission for Integrated Development of Horticulture (MIDH)' under Green Revolution Krishonnati Yojna.

Andhra Pradesh

3.122 Implementation of the scheme in Andhra Pradesh was continued during the year 2018-19 and an amount of ₹328.750 lakh was allotted for implementation of the scheme in 500 ha. As per the State level sanction an amount of ₹309.063 lakh was released to the Government of Andhra Pradesh. The State also requested an additional allocation of ₹1371.08 lakh for implementation of the scheme in an area of 3063.855 ha and issued administrative approval for the project proposal. Based on the State level sanction and availability of funds an amount of ₹1371.08 lakh was released for 3063.855 ha to Government of Andhra Pradesh during the period under report.

Goa

3.123 As per the allocation by the Board, State Level Administrative Approval and project proposal, an amount of ₹22.375 lakh was released under the scheme for implementation of the scheme in 50 ha in Goa.

Puducherry

3.124 An amount of ₹14.775 lakh released under the scheme to the Union Territory of Puducherry for 50 ha area during 2017-18 was fully revalidated for utilization during 2018-19, as per the request of the UT. No fund was released during the year 2018-19, though allocation of ₹17.90 lakh was made.

Lakshadweep

3.125 An allocation of ₹44.75 lakh was made towards the maintenance year subsidy for 100 ha during 2018-19. However, the same was not sanctioned as the amount of ₹100.68 lakh released during 2017-18 to UT of Lakshadweep was revalidated for utilization during 2018-19.

Assam

3.126 Implementation of the scheme was extended to Assam during the year 2018-19. Based on the allocation by the Board, State Level Administrative Approval and project proposal, an amount of ₹223.75 lakh was released under the scheme for implementation of the scheme in 500 ha in Assam.

Tripura

3.127 The 'Replanting and Rejuvenation of Coconut Gardens' scheme was also extended for implemented in Tripura during the year under report. An amount of ₹12.5973 lakh was released to state for implementation of the scheme in a total area of 35 ha.

Nagaland

3.128 An amount of ₹4.475 lakh was allocated under the scheme for implementation in 10 ha in Nagaland. As the State Government had requested for covering an area of 15 ha and based on the state level sanction and availability of funds, an amount of ₹5.419 lakh was released to State.

Mizoram

3.129 Implementation of the R&R scheme was also extended in the state of Mizoram during the year under report. An amount of ₹6.7125 lakh for 15 ha was released to the State based on the administrative approval issued by the State.

Summary of Achievements 2018-19 under 'Replanting and Rejuvenation'

3.130 The achievement recorded under the scheme 'Replanting and Rejuvenation' during 2018-19 was ₹6779.113 lakh against the budget provision of ₹3951.23 lakh and the State wise achievements are furnished below:

Assistance extended for losses in coconut sector due to natural calamities

3.131 As mentioned above, a total financial assistance of ₹12346.13 lakh was extended to four States during the year under report under the existing guidelines of CDB programmes as detailed below:

Kerala

3.132 Based on the request from Government of Kerala an additional assistance of ₹499.858 lakh was extended covering an area of 1117 ha for flood affected area as per the approved guidelines for Replanting and Rejuvenation programme.

Karnataka

- 3.133 An additional assistance of ₹200.033 lakh was extended covering an area of 447 ha for the drought affected areas of Karnataka based on the request from the State Government as per the approved guidelines for Replanting and Rejuvenation programme.
- 3.134 Under LODP scheme also, additional assistance has been provided to the State Government of Karnataka (₹875 lakh for 5000 ha).

Tamilnadu

3.135 During the year under report an amount of ₹9200.16 lakh was released to Government of Tamilnadu under the special package to mitigate the loss incurred due to Gaja cyclone in Tamilnadu for utilization during 2019-20. The components of the package are:

Andhra Pradesh

- 3.136 Under the R&R programme, ₹1371.08 lakh was extended covering an area of 3063.855 ha for the cyclone "Titli" affected areas of Andhra Pradesh based on the proposal of the Government of Andhra Pradesh.
- 3.137 Under LODP scheme also, additional assistance was provided to the State Government of Andhra Pradesh (₹200 lakh for 1142.84 ha)

F. Establishment of Centre of Excellence in Coconut

3.138 An allocation of ₹300 lakh was made for establishment of "Centre of Excellence in Coconut" in the Board's DSP Farm located in Dhali, Tiruppur District, Tamilnadu and the detailed project report is under the perusal of the Ministry.

G. Board's initiatives in Aspirational Districts Programme under Krishi Kalyan Abhiyan

- 3.139 During the year under report, the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare had communicated the implementation strategy and action plan of Krishi Kalyan Abhiyan to be implemented during 1st June to 31st July 2018 covering 25 villages in each of the 111 aspirational districts identified. As part of the Board's initiative under the programme, 83000 coconut seedlings of suitable varieties to 16600 families landed households (@ 5 coconut seedlings each) free of cost to 18 Aspirational Districts falling in 9 States where Board's DSP Farms are located for homestead/backyard gardening to encourage the farmers and create awareness about coconut and its cultivation and consumption. An amount of ₹44.318 lakh was incurred towards the cost of seedlings, transportation and other related expenses by utilizing the funds available under the head 'Information & Information Technology Publicity & Extension Activities' for the year 2018-19.
- 3.140 As per the short term action plan of the Abhiyan, overall coordination and implementation in 25 villages of a District will be carried out by KVK of that District. The distribution of coconut seedlings was taken up by the Board's unit offices in these States in association with KVK and State Departments.
- 3.141 As part of the implementation of Phase-II of the Aspirational District Programme, the Board had organized 'Field Days' demonstrating management and care of transplanted seedlings, lectures on scientific coconut cultivation and other aspects of coconut and CDB schemes in the Districts where coconut seedlings were distributed in Phase-I, with a total expenditure of ₹1.409 lakh met from the 'Information & Information Technology-Publicity & Extension Activities'.
- 3.142 An amount of ₹45.727 lakh was incurred by the Board under the Aspirational Districts Programme during the year under report. The district-wise list of seedlings distributed and expenditure incurred is given in **Table 15**.

6. Coconut Palm Insurance Scheme (CPIS)

3.143 Implementation of Coconut Palm Insurance Scheme (CPIS) was continued during the year 2018-19 with the objective of insuring coconut palms against natural calamities, climatic risks, pests diseases etc. The scheme was implemented in association with Agriculture Insurance Company Ltd. (AIC) and Departments of Agriculture/Horticulture of the State Governments concerned. Under the scheme 50 percent of the premium is contributed by Coconut Development Board and 25 percent each by the State Governments concerned and the beneficiary farmers. Administrative approvals for implementing the scheme were received from the states of Tamilnadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Puducherry, Odisha and Goa. Even though Administrative Approval was received from Lakshadweep and Kerala the scheme could not be implemented as the approval was received in the fag end of the financial year. Details of achievement under the scheme are given in **Table 16 to 18**:

7. Kera Suraksha Insurance Scheme

3.144 The Kera Suraksha Insurance scheme for Coconut Tree Climbers (CTC) continued during the year 2018-19. The insurance scheme is implemented in association with Oriental Insurance Company Ltd. The sum assured under the policy is ₹2.00 lakh. The period of insurance under the policy is one year with annual premium of ₹112.10 per beneficiary of which ₹84.10 is borne by the Board and the balance ₹28 contributed by the beneficiary. During the year under report the scheme covered all the trainees under the Board's Friends of Coconut Tree (FOCT) and Neera Technician Training Programme, wherein 100 percent of the premium for the insurance for the first year was borne by the Board. During the year under report, 3358 policies were issued, out of which 2449 were new policies and the remaining 909 were renewals. Cumulative number of policies issued under the scheme from the year 2011-12 is 73373. The percentage share of the claim amount settled to total premium paid was 35.10 (2018-19). The details are given below:

4. MARKETING, MARKET INTELLIGENCE SERVICES, STATISTICS AND STRENGTHENING OF EXPORT PROMOTION COUNCIL (EPC)

4.1 The Board undertakes market promotion activities for the development of the coconut sector in the country and the industry as mandated in the Coconut Development Board Act. The major activities comprise of Market Promotion, Market Intelligence, Market Research, Market Development, Farmer Producer Organization (FPOs), performing the responsibilities of Export Promotion Council and other enabling policies. The provisional expenditure incurred under the head "Market Promotion & Statistics" during the current year is ₹40.39 lakh, which is exclusive of the support provided under the scheme "Technology Mission on Coconut - Market Promotion".

I. Market Promotion

(a) Market Promotion projects supported under Technology Mission on Coconut

4.2 The Board undertakes market promotional activities which comprises of generic promotion of various coconut products through campaigns, advertisements, participation and organizing Buyer-Seller Meets in National and International Fairs, exhibitions, festivals etc. As per the revised pattern of assistance under MIDH the Board extends financial assistance in the form of subsidy for product promotion through electronic and print media, hoardings, danglers, kiosks, development of infrastructure for marketing coconut based products limited to a maximum of ₹25 lakh or 100% of the cost, whichever is less, to Government Agencies and Cooperative Societies, ₹6 lakh or 50% of the cost to Federation of CPS (FPOs) and ₹15 lakh for NGOs and Private Institutions. During the year under report, assistance was not extended under this project.

(b) Market Promotion Support for setting up of Coconut Kiosks

4.3 CDB is promoting market development of coconut production through the establishment of retail outlets or coconut kiosks by Farmer Producer organizations. During the year under report, CDB has facilitated establishment of 27 kiosks by FPOs in the states of Kerala and Tamilnadu.

II. Market Intelligence

- 4.4 The Board undertakes collection, compilation and dissemination of the market data in respect of daily, weekly, fortnightly and monthly prices and arrivals of coconut, copra and coconut oil from the major markets in various states of India. The Board also collects information on import and export of coconut and coconut products on regular basis from DGCIS, Customs and other reliable sources, which is compiled and published.
- 4.5 The project on Market Intelligence for the North East regions was in operation. Under the project, data on market prices and arrivals of tender coconut, mature coconut and other coconut products from a total of 11 major trading centres in Assam, Nagaland, Tripura and Arunachal Pradesh were collected and collated. A total amount of ₹2.75 lakh was expended for collection of market intelligence from the North East.

III. Market Research

4.6 Market Research projects are supported under the Technology Mission on Coconut. During the year under report, a project on "Market Analysis of Packed Tender Coconut Water in India" by the Institute of Agri Business Management, Swami Keshawanand Rajasthan University, Bikaner was approved at a total project cost of ₹5.00 lakh. The Institute completed the data collection process and data analysis and report preparation is progressing. An amount of ₹2.50 lakh was released as first instalment for the project.

IV. Market Development

- 4.7 As part of market promotion, 6 new components were introduced during the year under report for exporters and entrepreneurs. The six components are
 - (a) Assistance to entrepreneurs/CPCs to participate in domestic trade fairs/ exhibitions
 - (b) Buyer Seller meets in metro cities
 - (c) Skilled manpower development for processing
 - (d) Infrastructure support for establishment of procurement centres by FPOs

- (e) Assistance to Exporters for participation in international exhibitions/trade fairs/buyer seller meets
- (f) Assistance for Quality Certification
- 4.8 CDB extended opportunities for market development to entrepreneurs, processors and exporters by facilitating participation in various trade fairs and expos. During the year under report, the Board had facilitated participation of stakeholders in six domestic exhibitions in the country viz. 15th International Food and Beverage Processing Expo, Goa; World Coconut Day Exhibition organized by CDB at Raipur; Annapoorna World Food India International Exhibition and Conference, Mumbai; India International Trade Fair (IITF), New Delhi; 10th East Himalayan Expo, Shillong and 2nd edition of Emerging North East 2019, Guwahati. This has provided an opportunity for the entrepreneurs to improve market for their coconut products.
- 4.9 Apart from that, CDB had facilitated participation of four exporters in three International exhibitions viz. SIAL (Paris), Biofach (Germany) and Gulf Food (Dubai) and has extended financial assistance for participation in the same.
- 4.10 The details of the domestic and international exhibitions in which CDB has facilitated participation of entrepreneurs and FPOs are given below:

- 4.11 CDB has also organized a Buyer Seller Meet in Patna in October 2018 mainly for developing alternate marketing channels for raw coconut with the active participation of FPOs in northern states.
- 4.12 During the month of February and March 2019, CDB organized two seminars for exporters, one in Coimbatore on 22nd February 2019 and another in Bengaluru on 1st March 2019. The objective of the seminar was to provide an overall understanding of the present export scenario, trade barriers and tariffs and the beneficial schemes and provisions enabled by government agencies. Around 70 exporters from the State of Tamilnadu and Kerala attended the Seminar held at Coimbatore and around 80 exporters from the State of Karnataka, Maharashtra, Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat etc. attended the programme held at Bengaluru.

V. Farmer Producer Organization (FPO)

4.13 The Board facilitated the formation of Farmer Producer Organizations with the main objective of socio economic development of coconut farmers through productivity improvement, cost reduction, efficient aggregation, processing for value addition, better by-product utilization and efficient marketing of the produce. It aims at providing a fair, steady and reasonable income to farmers by organizing the unorganized coconut sector through farmer collectives. Farmer Producer Organizations provide a platform for the overall empowerment of farming community. True empowerment happens only when farmers are involved in all stages of the value addition supply chain, such as, production, aggregation, processing, marketing, distribution and sales. In a case where farmers restrict their action only to aggregation or collection, while letting private players do value addition and diversification, chances are that, farmers will end up agreeing to the terms of private players and remain price takers rather than price fixers. Only when farmers starts an enterprise of their own, they will learn to plan, collaborate, work in a team, take decisions and risks, interact with people from other spheres and sectors, thus learning and growing with the enterprise. This helps in inducing self confidence within the farmers thus enabling their overall development.

4.14 The Coconut Farmer Producer Organizations promoted by the Board have a three tier structure consisting of Coconut Producer Society (CPS), Coconut Producer Federation (CPF) and Coconut Producer Company (CPC).

Coconut Producer Society (CPS)

- 4.15 CPS is formed by associating 40-100 coconut growers in a contiguous area with range of 4000-6000 yielding palms. Farmers with a minimum of ten palms are only eligible to be a part of this society under the assumption that surplus coconut after domestic use is only generated in case the number of palms is more than ten. Once the society is formed, it is registered under the Charitable Societies Act and also with the Board. CPS is registered as a charitable society with the primary aim of spreading knowledge and good coconut cultivation practices among the public as well as to ease the formation of the Producer Company.
- 4.16 All the Societies have a common bye-law. The concept of CPS is based on the following points:
 - A non-subsidized, knowledge based, farmer centered approach in organizing farmers
 - Total inclusive growth of farmers
 - Facilitation, handholding, nurturing empowering and finally leading to sustainability
 - Group approach
 - Development of common infrastructure
 - Reduction of wastages
 - Disintermediation of supply chain
 - Product diversification including by-product utilization
 - Enhanced production, productivity
 - Market development

- 4.17 Main functions and procedures of CPS as conceived by CDB are as follows:
 - Regular meetings, discussion and planning of activities
 - Synchronizing harvesting operation
 - Effective pooling of resources
 - Integration of activities
 - Small scale activities at CPS level
 - Better by-product utilization

Coconut Producer Federation (CPF)

- 4.18 CPF is formed by combining 15 to 25 CPSs. A CPF would have around one lakh palms under it. CPF is also registered as a charitable society and further registered with CDB. The main activities and objectives of CPF are as follows:
 - To ensure integrated socio economic advancement of member CPS
 - To undertake pooling and collective marketing of the produce of CPS
 - To make available good quality seedlings to CPS
 - To disseminate latest technologies in production, procurement, processing and marketing
 - To undertake R&D activities in coconut based farming
 - To help members get credit facilities at lower interest rates
 - To train Friends of Coconut Trees (FoCT) and ensure their service for CPS
 - To identify good quality mother palms
 - To undertake measures for coconut based product diversification and value addition
 - To form more CPS in the operational area of CPF, if found necessary.

Coconut Producer Company (CPC)

4.19 10-20 CPFs would join together to form a CPC. A CPC would consist of around ten lakh yielding palms. The company would be registered under Section 581B of the

Indian Companies Act, 1956. The Producer Company is wholly and fully owned by the farmers. The main objectives of CPC are as below:

- Logical scaling up of CPS and CPF to CPC to ensure sustainable income
- Development of coconut farmers
- Decision making for sustained development of stakeholder (farmer)
- Capacity building and trainings for representatives from CPF and CPS
- Venturing into product diversification, processing and marketing
- Brand building and market development
- 4.20 Producer Company minimizes interference from other external bodies thus ensuring that the real power rests with members of the company itself. Collaboration with other institutions, raising investment etc. becomes easier in case of a Producer Company. Such company functions like any other private limited company with only difference being that the profit incurred flows back to farmers who own the company. The probability of such an enterprise sustaining is greater compared to co-operatives or other forms of collective. Further, three tier structure of Producer Company ensures maximum participation from farmers.

Activities undertaken by the FPOs for Market Promotion

4.22 Setting up of sales outlets/kiosks for value added coconut products with an objective of market development and market promotion of value added products of coconuts, Board is extending support to FPOs for establishing retail sales counters for coconut products. Under the programme Board extends reimbursement of 50% of the expenses subject to a maximum of ₹1.5 lakh towards the cost incurred on infrastructure. VI. Minimum Support Price (MSP)

4.23 The Government of India announces the Minimum Support Price (MSP) for Milling as well as Ball Copra on the recommendation of the Commission for Agriculture Costs and Prices (CACP) for every season. The Board provided its recommendations for the computation of CACP for the season 2019 based on the cost of cultivation of coconut and the cost of conversion to copra. The Government of India announced the Minimum Support Price (MSP) for Fair Average Quality (FAQ) milling copra is ₹9521 per quintal and that of Fair Average Quality (FAQ) of ball copra at ₹9920 per quintal for the season 2019. Based on the MSP for milling copra fixed for the season 2019, the Government of India has also declared equivalent price for matured dehusked coconut with water at ₹2571 per quintal.

VII. Export Promotion Council (EPC)

4.24 Department of Commerce, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Government of India has notified Coconut Development Board as an Export Promotion Council (EPC)

for all coconut products other than those made from coconut husk and fibre vide Public Notice No.169 (RE-2008)/2004-09 New Delhi dated the 1st April 2009. In pursuance of the above notification coconut products such as coconut water based products, raw coconuts, coconut oil, dry coconuts, ball copra, cut copra, medicated coconut oil, coconut oil based hair/massage oils, virgin coconut oil, coconut based convenience foods, coconut shell, coconut shell powder, coconut shell charcoal, coconut shell based activated carbon, coconut shell buttons, handicrafts made out of coconut shell and parts of coconut tree, coconut wood furniture etc. fall within the jurisdiction of the Coconut Development Board.

4.25 During the period under report 469 exporters have been issued Registration cum Membership Certificate (RCMC), making the cumulative registration to 3743 numbers.

Price Trend

4.29 The price of coconut and its products in all the important markets in the country expressed a mixed trend during the period under report.

Coconut Oil

- 4.30 The monthly average price of coconut oil at Kochi, which was ruling at ₹19840 per quintal during April 2018, expressed a declining trend except a slight increase in December 2018 and January 2019 and closed at ₹16542 per quintal in March 2019. The annual average price of ₹17414 per quintal was about 5 percent higher than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 70 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The prices of coconut oil in other two major markets in Kerala viz. Alappuzha and Kozhikode also moved in tune with that of the trend witnessed at Kochi market. The annual average price of ₹17405 per quintal at Alappuzha market was about 5 percent higher than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 70 percent higher than that of yearly average price of ₹18017 per quintal at Kozhikode market was almost same as that of the previous year 2017-18 and 71 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of coconut oil quoted at Kochi, Alappuzha and Kozhikode markets during the last three years and the corresponding graphical representations are given in **Table 19 to 21 and Fig.1 to 3**.
- 4.31 Kangayam in Tamilnadu is a major prominent market for copra and coconut oil. Since many of the coconut oil processing units in Tamilnadu are concentrated in Erode-Kanagayam belt, Kangayam has been emerged as the biggest copra and coconut oil trading centre in the country.
- 4.32 The monthly average price of coconut oil which opened at ₹18076 per quintal at Kangayam market during April 2018, expressed a downward trend except a slight increase in December 2018 and January 2019 and the price closed at ₹12905 per quintal. The yearly average price of ₹15131 was about 2 percent higher than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 64 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of coconut oil quoted at Kangayam market during

the last three years and the corresponding graphical representations are given in **Table 22 and Fig.4**.

4.33 The international price of coconut oil, which opened at US\$ 1138 per MT in April 2018, expressed an overall downward trend during the year and closed at US\$ 682 in March 2019. The yearly average price of US \$ 871 per MT was about 42 percent lower than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 45 percent lower than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The international price of coconut oil during the last three years and the corresponding graphical representation are given in **Table 23 and Fig.5**.

4.34 The domestic prices of coconut oil averaged at USD 2577 per MT during 2018-19, which is almost double of the international price of coconut oil which averaged at USD 871 per MT (RBI conversion rate 2018-19: 1USD= ₹69.92)

Desiccated Coconut

4.35 The international price of desiccated coconut, which opened at US\$ 2475 per MT in April 2018, expressed an overall downward trend during the year and closed at US\$ 1720 per MT in March 2019. The yearly average price of US\$ 2174 per MT was about 14 percent lower than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 11 percent lower than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The international price of desiccated coconut during the last three years and the corresponding graphical representation are given in **Table 24 and Fig.6**.

Milling Copra

4.36 The monthly average price of FAQ grade milling copra at Kochi, which opened at ₹13217 per quintal during the month of April 2018, expressed a downward trend during the year except a slight increase in December 2018 and January 2019. The price at this market closed at ₹10442 per quintal in March 2019. The prices of milling copra in other two major markets in Kerala viz. Alappuzha and Kozhikode also moved in tune with that of the trend witnessed at Kochi market. The annual average prices of ₹11329 per quintal at Kochi market and ₹11194 per quintal at Alappuzha market in 2018-19 were about 0 to 2 percent higher than those of the previous year 2017-18 and about 69 to 70 percent higher than those of yearly average prices of 2016-17 in the

respective markets. The annual average price of ₹11385 per quintal at Kozhikode market were 2% lower than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 71% higher than that of 2016-17. The monthly average price of milling copra quoted at Kochi, Alappuzha and Kozhikode markets in Kerala during the last three years and the corresponding graphical representations are given in **Table 25 to 27 and Fig.7 to 9**.

- 4.37 The monthly average price of milling copra at Kangayam in Tamilnadu which opened at ₹12608 per quintal in April 2018 expressed an overall downward trend and closed at ₹9235 per quintal. The annual average price of ₹10395 per quintal was almost same as that of the previous year 2017-18 and 63 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of milling copra quoted at Kangayam market during the last three years and the corresponding graphical representation are given in **Table 28 and Fig.10**.
- 4.38 The yearly International average price of copra at Philippines/Indonesia (CIF N.W. Europe) market was US\$ 571 per MT in 2018-19, which was about 43 percent lower than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 45 percent lower than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of milling copra quoted at Philippines/Indonesia (CIF N.W. Europe) markets during the last three years and the corresponding graphical representations are given in **Table 29 and Fig.11**.
- 4.39 The domestic average price of copra (USD 1620 per MT) was 2.8 times higher than the International price (USD 571 per MT).

Ball Copra

4.40 Tiptur APMC market in Karnataka is the biggest ball copra market in the country. The price of ball copra at Tiptur, which opened at ₹13743 per quintal during the month of April 2018 expressed a mixed trend and closed at ₹16365 in March 2019. The yearly average price of ₹15932 per quintal was about 43 percent higher than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 118 percent lower than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The price of ball copra at Arsikere market in Karnataka, which opened at ₹13540 per quintal also expressed a mixed trend and closed at ₹16114 in March 2019. The yearly average price of ₹15708 per quintal was about 48 percent higher than that of the previous year 2017-18 and 120 percent higher than that of yearly average price of

2016-17. The monthly average price of ball copra quoted at Tiptur and Arsikere markets in Karnataka during the last three years and the corresponding graphical representation are given in **Table 30 & 31 and Fig.12 & 13**.

4.41 In Kerala, Kozhikode is the major market for ball copra and edible grade copra. The monthly average price of ball copra at Kozhikode market, which opened at ₹15838 per quintal during the month of April 2018, expressed a mixed trend during the financial year and closed at ₹13123 per quintal in March 2019. The annual average price of ₹15682 per quintal was 40 percent higher than the previous year 2017-18 and 131 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of Rajapur edible copra at Kozhikode market, which opened at ₹17188 per quintal during the month of April 2018 expressed a mixed trend during the year and closed at ₹15152 per quintal in March 2019. The annual average price of ₹17597 per quintal was 41 percent higher than the previous year 2017-18 and about 124 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average prices of ball copra and Rajapur copra quoted at Kozhikode markets during the last three years and the corresponding graphical representations are given in **Table 32 & 33 and Fig.14 & 15**.

Coconut

4.42 The price of dry coconut at Kozhikode market, which opened at ₹9550 per thousand nuts in April 2018 expressed an increasing trend till July and therafter expressed a declining trend and closed at ₹7268 in March 2019. The yearly average price of ₹9165 per thousand nuts was about 6 percent higher than the previous year 2017-18 and 44 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of coconut (without husk) at Alappuzha market opened at ₹17977 per thousand nuts during April 2018, expressed an overall declining trend except during the month of December and January. The price closed at ₹16732 per thousand nuts in March 2019. The yearly average price of ₹17336 per thousand nuts was about 16 percent higher than the previous year 2017-18 and 49 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of dry coconut quoted at Kozhikode and coconut without husk quoted at Alappuzha markets in Kerala and the corresponding graphical representation are given in **Table 34 & 35 and Fig.16 & 17**.


4.43 In Karnataka, Arsikere and Mangalore are the major markets for partially dehusked coconut. The monthly average price of partially dehusked coconut at Arsikere market in Karnataka, which opened at ₹21000 per thousand nuts in April 2018 expressed an overall mixed trend during the financial year and closed at ₹14963 in March 2019. The yearly average price of ₹16038 per thousand nuts was 14 percent higher than the previous year 2017-18 and about 68 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The price of partially dehusked coconut (Grade-I quality) at Mangalore market which opened at ₹23000 per thousand nuts in April 2018 expressed a mixed trend during the financial year and closed at ₹21000 in March 2019. The yearly average price of ₹20866 per thousand nuts was about 6 percent higher than the previous year 2017-18 and 39 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of partially dehusked coconut quoted at Arsikere and Mangalore markets in Karnataka and the corresponding graphical representations are given in **Table 36 & 37 and Fig.18 & 19**.

4.44 The price of green coconut at Pollachi market in Tamilnadu, opened at ₹16484 per thousand nuts in April 2018 and closed at ₹12194 per thousand nuts in March 2019. The yearly average price of ₹13483 per thousand nuts was about 13 percent lower than the last year 2017-18 and 65 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The yearly average price of black coconut at Pollachi market in Tamilnadu was ₹13704 per thousand nuts, which was about 13 percent lower than the last year 2017-18 and 63 percent higher than that of yearly average price of 2016-17. The monthly average price of green coconut and black coconut (without husk) quoted at Pollachi market and the corresponding graphical representation are given in **Table 38** & **39 and Fig.20 & 21**.

4.45 The domestic price of dehusked coconut in Phlippines opened at \$175 per MT and closed at \$116 per MT with an yearly average of \$132 per MT during the year 2018-19. The monthly average price of coconut in Phlippines and the corresponding graphical representation are given in **Table 40 and Fig.22**.















B. STATISTICS

Area and Production of Coconut

4.46 As per the All India statistics of the coconut for the year 2017-18, the area and production of coconut in the country is 20.97 lakh hectares and 23798.23 million nuts respectively. The corresponding figures for the year 2016-17 were 20.82 lakh hectares and 23904.10 million nuts. In comparison to the previous year, the area under coconut cultivation increased by 0.82 percent and coconut production decreased by 0.44 percent.




Fig.24: Major Coconut Producing States in India -Production (Million Nuts) - 2017-18 Others, Andhra 1655.09, Pradesh, 6.96% **13**96.89, Kerala, 8452.05, 35.52% Tamilnadu, 6020.41, 25.30% Karnataka, 6273.79, 26.36%

4.47 The four southern states of Kerala, Karnataka, Tamilnadu and Andhra Pradesh accounted for 89.02 percent of the coconut area and 93.05 percent of the coconut production in the country. Kerala, with the largest area under coconut cultivation and production, accounted for 38.49 percent of the area under the crop and 35.52 percent of production at national level. Area and production of coconut in the major coconut growing States in India are shown in **Fig.23 & 24**.

Productivity

4.48 The productivity per hectare of coconut in the national level for 2017-18 is 11350 nuts per hectare which showed a decrease by 1.14 percentage over the previous year 2016-17. The highest productivity is reported in Andhra Pradesh at 14038 nuts per hectare followed by Tamilnadu at 13637 nuts per hectare and West Bengal 12484 nuts per hectare.

4.49 Over the last ten years area, production and productivity of coconut in India has increased at an annual growth rate of 0.97 percent, 4.90 percent and 3.89 percent respectively. State wise productivity and all India productivity for 2017-18 are shown in **Fig.25 & 26**. The statistics relating to State-wise area, production and productivity of coconut released by the Department of Agriculture, Cooperation and Farmers Welfare (Horticulture Division), Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare, Government of India is given in **Table 41**. The details of area and production of major coconut growing States for last five years is shown in **Fig.27 & 28**. The trend in area,

production and productivity of coconut in India during the last ten years is shown in **Table 42 and Fig.29 to 31**.

4.50 As per 2016 world statistics India is the largest coconut producing country in the world, contributing 33.02% of the world production. World Production has increased from 67041.67 million nuts in 2015 to 67128 million nuts in 2016. India, Indonesia and Philippines are the leading coconut growing countries having 76.38% of the total area under coconut and contribute 74.37% of the coconut production in the world. Among the coconut growing countries, India holds the highest productivity of 10616 nuts per ha followed by Vietnam with 8915 nuts per ha. Trend in area, production and productivity of coconut in major coconut growing countries in the world is given in **Table 43 and Fig.32 to 34**.

Export and Import of Coconut Products

Export

- 4.51 During the year 2018-19 (up to February 2019) export of coconut products (excluding coir items) was valued at ₹1873.55 crores against ₹1603.27 crores over the corresponding period previous year. Coconut exports recorded an increase of 16.86% in terms of value. Major export items are activated carbon, dry coconut and Fresh coconut in terms of value. USA is the largest importer of coconut shell based activated carbon followed by United Kingdom and Japan in terms of value whereas Afghanistan is the largest importer of coconut dried followed by Pakistan and Iran. UAE, Oman and Qatar are the major importers of fresh coconut from India. Contribution of activated carbon alone to the total export is 65.41% whereas dried coconut contributed 9.97%, in terms of value. The trend in export value for the last five years is shown in Fig.35. The export of coir and coir products from India during the last five years is shown in Fig.36.
- 4.52 Over the last five years, value of export of coconut products showed an increasing trend from ₹1312.38 crores in 2014-15, to ₹1873.55 crores in 2018-19 (up to February 2019). The trade balance for the last five years is shown in **Table 44** which is positive in all the five years. The export statistics of coconut and coir

products are shown in **Table 45 & 46**. The per capita availability of coconut in India is shown in **Fig.37**.

Import

4.53 During the year 2018-19 (up to February 2019), import of coconut products (excluding coir items) was valued at ₹535.45 crores as against ₹300.30 crores over the corresponding period of the previous year. This shows an increase in the value of import by 78.31 percent. The major items of import are oil cake followed by shell charcoal and copra in terms of value. Copra oil cake alone recorded 60.46% and shell charcoal recorded 14.60% of the total coconut products imported during the year in terms of value. Increase in import of oil cake is mainly attributed to the difference in price compared to the domestic market and is mainly used for manufacturing cattle feed. Indonesia is the largest supplier of copra expeller cake. Copra import was under advance authorization scheme, whereby the imported products are exported after value addition. The import statistics of coconut products for the last five years is shown in **Table 47**.






Fig.27: Major Coconut Growing States - Area in last five years ('000 Ha)








Publicity and Extension Activities

- ❖ Displayed Board's audio visual promotional advertisement through LED screens of South, West and North Zones of Railway.
- 5.1 Coconut Development Board is carrying out product promotional campaigns and dissemination of information on the activities of the Board among farmers, entrepreneurs and stakeholders through various extension tools under Publicity, Extension Activities & IT. Intensive publicity campaign carried out in the country and abroad by publicity and extension wing not only created better outreach for coconut and its products but also enhanced the demand of coconut products in the domestic and overseas markets. Besides providing information on coconut, printing and production of publications, organizing extension activities including conduct of awareness programmes (state, district and block level) ,National level seminars, FPO meetings, Exposure visit within the state and outside state , skill development training programmes, exhibitions, giving awards to recognize excellence in different fields, product promotion through mass media, etc. are some of the major extension tools through which the message on coconut percolates up to the grass root level. 'FoCT'

training is one of the major skill development training programmes implemented in Kerala and other coconut growing states through which massive employment generation could be created in coconut sector. Neera technician training programme is another skill development training programme to tap inflorescence sap through trained technicians. In order to ensure the availability of trained technician in the field, an agreement is being made with the technicians for two years. One week skill development training in Handicraft was also organized at State centres, Regional offices viz. West Bengal, Assam, Maharashtra, Bihar and Kerala. The expenditure incurred during the period under report was ₹7.32 crores.

Publications

- 5.2 Printing and publishing is an important extension activity undertaken by Coconut Development Board. The Board brings out periodicals in seven languages viz. Hindi, English, Kannada, Malayalam, Tamil Marathi and Telugu. The periodical in English, titled Indian Coconut Journal, is widely circulated in India among the progressive farmers, extension workers and scientists and is also subscribed by research institutes in other coconut growing countries.
- 5.3 The periodicals in vernacular languages cater to the information needs of regional farmers. Regular dissemination of information through the periodicals facilitates the transfer of technology and helps not only to overcome the communication gap between extension workers and farmers but also helps to promote sustainable development of coconut cultivation and industry in the country. During the period under report, maximum effort was taken to enhance the circulation of vernacular journals. Following are the periodicals published by the Board during the period under report.
 - 1) Indian Coconut Journal (English monthly)

Technical Advice to Coconut Farmers and Entrepreneurs

5.5 Large number of farmers, industrialists, entrepreneurs and exporters connected with coconut industry were given technical advice through different means. Board sponsored many agricultural seminars organized by the ICAR, CPCRI, ATMA, State Departments/ other agencies such as CII, FICCI etc. which helped to disseminate the messages on coconut farming and Board's activities. Board also disseminated information on products/ manufacturer profiles to consumers/exporters/importers of coconut products. The success stories on coconut based farming systems, production and marketing of various value added products, implementation of green collar jobs such as neera technicians and FoCT, FPO level activities etc were published in Board's journals, other farm journals and leading dailies which had become an effective extension tool.

Product Promotion through Mass Media

- 5.6 Board's programmes were aired through AIR Thiruvananthapuram, AIR FM North and Radio Mirchi stations across the country. Radio jingles based on various programmes of CDB, especially value added products of coconut, mainly on coconut oil and VCO, Neera and other value added products, Insurance Scheme of CDB and TMOC programmes in various languages were aired all over the country.
- 5.7 Coconut Development Board has been undertaking multi media product promotional campaign for promoting coconut and coconut products. During the year under report, the major objective of the Below the Line (BTL) activities was to disseminate information to public on basket of major value added coconut products viz. virgin coconut oil, coconut oil, tender coconut water, desiccated coconut powder, milk, milk powder, neera and its value-added products etc. The campaign was carried

- out intensively through print and electronic media covering national/regional newspapers, magazines, weeklies, TV channels, Radio and Outdoor media/BTL (Below the line) activities. These efforts have helped to give wide coverage on the goodness of coconut and increased the level of consumption of coconut products.
- 5.8 As part of product promotions some of the promotional programmes were aired through AIR-Thiruvananthapuram such as Daily Farm News, Gramarangam, Vayalum Veedum and Pularvettam programme. The programme covered all aspects on coconut including value added products of coconut, CDB's promotional spots especially on coconut oil, VCO, neera, tender coconut water, Coconut Palm Insurance Scheme, neera and Kera Suraksha programme. Board's programmes were also aired through seven FM stations viz. AIR FM Gold, VB Mumbai, Guwahati, Mangalore, Panaji, Lucknow and Kolkata stations. Besides the programme aired in different languages such as Tamil, Kannada, Hindi, Marathi and Telugu in the cities such as Delhi, Kolkata, Chennai, Ahamedabad, Patna, Rajkot, Nashik, Guwahati, and Coimbatore for 15 days through Radio Mirchi had provided maximum coverage to Board's activities. All these radio programmes received ample listenership.
- 5.9 Board's activities and programmes had received wide reach among farmers through the release of advertisements in agriculture magazines like Karshakan, Karshakashree, Agriculture and Industry survey (English, Hindi & Malayalam), Krishi Jagaran (Hindi, Malayalam and English), Fasal Kranthi, Pasumai Vikatan (Tamil) etc. Generic promotion of coconut was also done through regionwise advertorials in mainline magazines. Advertorials and articles were published in mainline magazines viz. The Week (English), Femina (English, Hindi & Bengla), Grehalakshmi (Hindi), Airport authority of India (English), Subhyathra (English), India Today (English), Manorama Weekly (Malayalam), Lok Panchayath (Hindi), Grihasobha (Hindi & Gujarathi), Saritha (Hindi), Woman's era (English), Kumudam weekly, Snehidi and Manvasanai (Tamil), Pasumai Vikatan (Tamil), Taranga Kannada (Kannada), Vanitha (Malayalam & Hindi), The Hindu Frontline (English), Meri Saheli (Hindi), Janmabhumi, Kesari (Malayalam), Mathrubhumi weekly, Navabharath daily, Dainik Bhaskar and Dainik Jagaran daily (Hindi), Karshakasree (Malayalam) and Grihalakshmi (Malayalam) during the year under report.

- 5.10 Board's website acts as a strong media with updated information on the activities of the Board. Important events and activities are uploaded in Board's website. Films on various aspects of coconut such as scientific coconut cultivation, value addition, product promotion success stories and stories on curing of diseases such as diabetes, cardiovascular diseases, Alzheimer's, thyroid, autism and colon cancer through intake of coconut oil were posted in the Board's website.

Extension Activities 2018-19

5.11 Coconut Development Board has taken steps to give wide publicity to Board's schemes and activities as part of the awareness training programmes conducted at different parts of the country through its regional and state centers in India. Through these programmes, the Board could create awareness about scientific cultivation, processing and value addition of coconut among farming community and stake holders. As part of awareness programme, Board has given training to around 22894 individual farmer participants in the country during the financial year 2018-19. In order to create awareness, Board has also given publicity about the programme through All India Radio/FM Radio, dailies/local channels, Board's monthly and quarterly journals, website etc. Press releases were issued about national and state level programmes in various languages.

Friends of Coconut Tree (FoCT)

5.13 Coconut Development Board is conducting the "Friends of Coconut Tree" (FoCT) training programme since August 2011 with the objective of imparting training to 5000 unemployed youth in Kerala. Taking into account the successful completion of 260 batches of Friends of Coconut Tree (FoCT) training programme (first phase) under palm climbing training programme during the year 2011-12 and considering the wide demand from neighbouring coconut growing states, the Board extended the programme to Tamilnadu, Karnataka, Andhra Pradesh, Goa and Andaman & Nicobar Islands during 2012-13 as the second phase in addition to Kerala. Later, the programme was implemented in other states such as Maharashtra, Assam, Bihar, West Bengal, Odisha, Chhattisgarh and Gujarat during the third phase. In 4th Phase 15178 persons were trained in 759 batches throughout the country. The training created massive employment generation with the support of KVKs/NGOs/FPOs to realize better income and livelihood for FoCTs at their native place. In the 5th phase 9350 persons were trained in 465 batches and in the 6th phase 5349 persons

were trained in 265 batches during the financial year 2016-17. In the 7th phase 3351 persons were trained in 168 batches during the financial year 2017-18 and in the 8th phase 1830 persons were trained in 91 batches during the financial year 2018-19. From 1st to 8th phase, altogether 62828 persons were trained under this programme.

Activities of FoCT in website

5.14 CDB has uploaded the region wise list along with the contact number of all trainees in the website of the Board. In order to monitor the effective implementation of the programme, Board has requested all the trainees to send daily SMS to the Board on their daily activities like the number of trees they have climbed, wages charged and the day's income. Utilizing this internet facility it is possible to follow up and assess the performance of the trained FOCTs.

Distribution of Coconut Palm Climbing Machine

5.15 Timely distribution of palm climbing devices to the training centres in Kerala and outside states is being carried out through the Regional Agro Industrial Development Co-operative of Kerala Ltd. (RAIDCO) and Kerala Agro Industries Corporation (KAICO) Ltd., Government of Kerala.

Neera Technician Training Programme

5.16 Board has undertaken the initiative of developing a pool of skilled Neera Technicians after the amendment of Abkari rule in Kerala after 112 years effort. Extracting neera requires technically skilled persons to perform activities such as climbing tree, skillfully stimulating the inflorescence, application of disinfectant, wrapping the inflorescence etc. in hygienic manner. Board is organizing Neera Technician training programme from 2014-15 onwards. This training is of a period of 42 days, with total time duration of 240 hours. On the job training is also arranged for 2 weeks as part of training curriculum. It is open for anyone from any profession or unemployed youth belonging to the age group of 18-50 years. So far 2637 Neera Technicians were trained through FPOs and CIT Vazhakulam.

Coconut Museum

5.21 A Coconut Museum is set up at the CDB Headquarter premises in Kochi. The Museum displays versatile uses of coconut, coconut products and coconut palm parts. A vast variety of handicrafts, curios and utility items made of coconut and informative charts on production, cultivation, marketing and health aspects of coconut are displayed in the coconut museum. The museum is being maintained in good condition and is regularly visited by group of farmers, tourists and other visitors. Since Museum is having a place in Google website a lot of foreign tourists are also regularly visiting the museum.

Library and Information Centre

- 5.27 The Library and Information Centre caters to the need of administrative and technical staff of CDB, research scholars from universities/colleges and entrepreneurs from coconut industry. 16 research scholars and faculties from Agricultural Universities/Departments in and outside of Kerala, 95 officers/staff from CDB, and farmers/entrepreneurs from farmer producer organizations have visited and make use of the Library during the period under report.
- 5.28 The present collection contains 7339 books. During the year, 213 books were added to the stock of the Library out of which 80 are Hindi books. Received and indexed 451 issues of journals as subscription/gift/exchange. One technical journal, Food & Beverage World was newly subscribed during the year. Copies of Hindi Books titled "Karyalay Deepika" and "Karyalay Praveenatha" have been purchased and transferred to 22 unit offices of CDB.

- 5.29 Subscribed Food Marketing & Technology for the use of CIT, Vazhakulam, Agriculture & Industry Survey for Regional Offices of CDB in Karnataka, Tamilnadu and Assam, State Centres in Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Odisha and West Bengal, DSP Farms in Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Mandya, Bihar, Kondagaon and Neriamangalam and MDIC, Delhi. Back volumes of Swamys News, National Geographic and Sea News Circular have been bounded during the period under report.
- 5.30 LIBSOFT Server Version 4.1 has been updated during the period. 114 articles from Indian Coconut Journal and 97 articles from Indian Nalikera Journal have been indexed in the Software. Important articles on coconut and related subjects from other technical journals have also been indexed. Databases were updated with the details of 213 books and 251 articles.

Services

Newspaper Clipping Service

5.31 A Newspaper clipping service covering news items on coconut and related subjects is available in the Library. Photocopies of 323 press clippings in Malayalam and 71 in English have been taken and indexed during the period.

Reprography Service

5.32 Library and Information Centre provided reprographic services such as scanning/photocopying of articles/news to CDB staff as well as to visitors. Photocopies of 57 articles in Malayalam and 29 articles in English have been taken and filed.

Exchange of Publications

- 5.33 Library and Information Centre received Annual Reports, Research Highlights/ Newsletters and journals from other Central/State Government and private institutions. Copies of Annual Report of the Board, Indian Coconut Journal and Indian Nalikera Journal have been forwarded to other institutions on reciprocal/gift basis.

5.49 Monitoring of all computer related activities including strengthening, maintenance and processing of electronic data in Coconut Development Board comes under Information and Information Technology. Additional hardware and peripherals required to strengthen the existing system and development of custom based application software to monitor future requirements with respect to Headquarters and other unit offices are looked after by the EDP section.

Video conferencing

5.50 Video conferencing facility installed at Headquarters, Regional Offices at Bengaluru, Guwahati, Chennai, State Centres at Kolkata and Vijayawada was utilized to conduct regular reviews of the programmes with unit offices. The existing BSNL internet leased line connection with 6 Mbps bandwidth over Optical Fiber Cable at headquarters and the 516 Mbps internet leased line continued at Regional Office, Bengaluru, Guwahati, Chennai for video conferencing and internet access. Usage of e-facility in office communication and decision making has been intensified.

6. TECHNOLOGY MISSION ON COCONUT

BACK GROUND

- Mission on Coconut (TMOC)", during the year 2001-02. The scheme is implemented in a project mode to address issues such as product diversification, by-product utilization, market promotion of coconut and its products and productivity improvement through the management of pest and diseases. Department of Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare (DAC&FW) of the Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare is the nodal agency for the Mission. A National Steering Committee headed by the Special Secretary/Additional Secretary (Agriculture, Cooperation & Farmers Welfare), Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare with Horticulture Commissioner as Member Secretary Monitor the implementation of the programme. The Chairman, Coconut Development Board acts as Mission Director. A Project Approval Committee with the Mission Director as its head considers the projects for approval.
- 6.2 During the period under report, the Project Approval Committee (PAC) met once in its 52nd Meeting on 14.01.2019 at Kochi. During the year 26 new projects were approved by the PAC. An amount of ₹500 lakh was allocated for implementation of 'Technology Mission on Coconut' during the year 2018-19. Against this an amount of ₹535.63 lakh was spent for implementation of the Mission projects as shown below:

The duration of the project is two years. First instalment financial assistance of ₹31.50 lakh was released during the period under report.

(3) Development of Digital Image Database with an Android Apps and Web system for the detection of major pests and diseases of coconut of Assam

6.7 The project was sanctioned to Assam Agricultural University, Jorhat, Assam. The PAC in its 53rd meeting held at Kochi on 29.04.2018 approved the project with a total project cost of ₹18.42 lakh. The duration of the project is two years. First

instalment financial assistance of ₹11.61 lakh was released during the period under report.

(3) Development of sensory lexicon for selected coconut based products

6.11 The project was sanctioned to CSIR-CFTRI, Mysuru, Karnataka. The PAC in its 52nd meeting held at Kochi on 14.01.2019 approved the project with a total project cost of ₹10.45 lakh. The duration of the project is 24 months. First instalment financial assistance of ₹5.23 lakh was released during the period under report.

(4) Development of Coconut based products for sustenance in sports

6.12 The project was sanctioned to CSIR-CFTRI, Mysuru, Karnataka. The PAC in its 52nd meeting held at Kochi on 14.01.2019 approved the project with a total project cost of ₹23.25 lakh. The duration of the project is 24 months. First instalment financial assistance of ₹10.60 lakh was released during the period under report.

(5) Design and Development of Reactor for Processing of Coconut-Based Beverages with UV-C Irradiation

6.13 The project was sanctioned to CSIR-CFTRI, Mysuru, Karnataka. The PAC in its 53rd meeting held at Kochi on 29.04.2019 approved the project with a total project cost of ₹26.75 lakh. The duration of the project is 24 months. First instalment financial assistance of ₹21.25 lakh was released during the period under report.

(6) Application of coconut flour in improving functional, rheological and nutritional properties of wheat dough

6.14 The project was sanctioned to CSIR-CFTRI, Mysuru, Karnataka. The PAC in its 53rd meeting held at Kochi on 29.04.2019 approved the project with a total project cost of ₹14.97 lakh. First instalment financial assistance of ₹44.88 lakh was released during the period under report.

(9) Evaluation of Coconut Oil for application in High Voltage Transformers

6.17 The project was sanctioned to North Eastern Institute of Science and Technology, Nirjuli, Arunachal Pradesh. The PAC in its 53rd meeting held at Kochi on 29.04.2019 approved the project with a total project cost of ₹27.98 lakh. The duration of the project is 24 months. First instalment financial assistance of ₹13.99 lakh was released during the period under report.

6.27 The project was submitted by Vama Oil Pvt. Ltd., Coimbatore, Tamilnadu. The objective of the project is setting up of a unit for the Production of Dietary Fibre From Coconut Flour with a capacity to process 4.00 MT of coconut flour per day to produce 1.20 MT dietary fibre.

6.28 The PAC in its 51st meeting held on 19.01.2018 approved the project at a total cost of ₹206 lakh and a total subsidy of ₹44.49 lakh was sanctioned to the unit. First instalment of financial assistance for ₹22.25 lakh was released during the period under report.

(5) Setting up of ball copra making unit

6.29 The project was submitted by Shri K.T. Francis, Kaithakulam Boda Making Unit, Maruthonkara, Kavilumpara, Kozhikode, Kerala. The objective of the project is to process 80000 coconuts per year.

6.30 The PAC in its 51^{st} meeting held on 19.01.2018 approved the project at a total cost of ₹25.00 lakh and a total subsidy of ₹0.88 lakh was sanctioned to the unit. First instalment of financial assistance for ₹0.44 lakh was released during the period under report.

7. PROGRESSIVE USE OF HINDI

- 7.1 Concerted efforts were made to promote the use of Official Language Hindi in the official work and to ensure the implementation of Official Language policy of the Union in the Board. The provisions of Official Language Act and Rules, Annual Programme 2018-19 issued by the Department of Official Language, Ministry of Home Affairs, assurances given to the Second Sub Committee of the Parliamentary Committee on Official Language and also the orders issued by the Government of India on implementation of Official Language from time to time were complied with.
- 7.2 Coconut Development Board was awarded the Rajbhasha Kirti Puraskar (III Prize) for the year 2017-18 for the outstanding performance in the implementation of Official Language Policy of the Union amongst the Central Government Offices situated in Region 'C'. Dr. Raju Narayana Swamy IAS, Chairman of the Board received the award from the Hon'ble Vice President of India Shri Venkaiah Naidu at a function organized on 14th September 2018, the Hindi Day, at Vigyan Bhavan, New Delhi. Shri Rajnath Singh, Hon'ble Minister for Home Affairs, Shri Kiren Rijiju and Shri Hansraj Gangaram Ahir, Ministers of State for Home Affairs and other dignitaries were present on the occasion.

Rule 10(4) of Official Language Rules, 1976

7.3 As and when 80% of the officers and staff of an office acquire working knowledge in Hindi that office is notified under Rule 10(4) of the Official Language Rules. The Headquarters of the Board, the Regional Offices at Bengaluru, Chennai, Guwahati and Patna, the State Centres at Kolkata, Pitapally, Port Blair, Vijayawada and Thane and the DSP Farms at Abhayapuri, Madhepura, Mandya, Kondagaon, Pitapally, Neriamangalam, Palghar and Vegiwada and MDIC, Delhi were already notified under Rule 10(4) of the Official Language Rules, 1976.

Incentive Scheme

7.4 The Incentive Scheme for doing original work in Hindi is continued in the Board. With a view to encourage the Officers and staff to do more and more work in

Hindi, the Board has launched an incentive scheme of its own. The particulars of the scheme are as follows:

Target fixed for Offices situated in Region 'C'

For first 2000 words ₹400

For next 2000 words up to 10000 words

₹150 each for every 2000 words

₹400 each for every 5000 words

The target is double for offices located in Region 'A' and 'B'.

- 7.5 During the period under report, 18 employees of the Headquarters and 20 employees of the Unit Offices were awarded the cash incentive under the incentive scheme for doing original work in Hindi.
- 7.6 An Incentive Scheme for dictation in Hindi is also continued to motivate officers to give dictation in Hindi. As per the scheme, the officers who dictate 5000 words or more in Hindi in a year will be given a cash incentive of Rs.1000/-.

Compliance of Official Language Act/Rules

- 7.7 In pursuance of Official Language policy of the Union, all papers and documents coming under Section 3(3) of the Official Language Act are issued bilingually. A total of 2132 nos. of papers were issued bilingually during the year.
- 7.8 The letters received in Hindi were invariably replied to in Hindi.
- 7.9 Hindi versions of the Annual Report and Audit Report for the year 2017-18 were issued.
- 7.10 The advertisements for recruitment to various posts were published bilingually in the Employment News and Rozgar Samachar and also in the Board's Website. The advertisements and advertorials for product promotion were issued in print and electronic media in Hindi.
- 7.11 a) All manuals, codes and other procedural literature are bilingual.
 - b) All forms were made bilingual.
 - c) All sign boards, rubber stamps, name plates, letter heads, visiting cards etc. were made bilingual.

Hindi Noting and Correspondence

- 7.12 The Officers and the staff of the Board were encouraged to do more and more noting and drafting in Hindi. During the period under report, 68.17% of noting were done in Hindi against the target of 30% prescribed by the Department of Official Language. All the employees who are proficient in Hindi are doing their work exclusively in Hindi.
- 7.13 During the period under report, the achievement of correspondence in Hindi is more than the prescribed target of 55% by the Department of Official Language i.e., 87.92% of letters were sent to Region 'A', 91.03% to Region 'B' and 76.74% to Region 'C' from the Headquarters in Hindi.

Official Language Implementation Committee

- 7.14 The Official Language Implementation Committee is functioning in the Headquarters as well as in all the Unit Offices of the Board.
- 7.15 During the period under report four Meetings of the Official Language Implementation Committee were held and follow up actions were taken in the Headquarters as well as in the Unit Offices.

Quarterly Progress Report

- 7.16 A Quarterly Report on the progressive use of Hindi is prepared after collecting the data from various sections in every quarter and submitted on line to Department of Official Language, Ministry of Home Affairs.
- 7.17 A Quarterly Report on the progressive use of Hindi is prepared and sent to Official Language division of Department of Agriculture, Cooperation and Farmers Welfare, Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare in every quarter.
- 7.18 The Quarterly Progress Reports of the Sections of the Headquarters were reviewed in the OLIC Meetings and the Section Heads were appreciated for the progress achieved in the percentage of Hindi correspondence. The shortfalls, if any, were also pointed out in the meetings and follow up actions were taken.

7.19 The Quarterly Progress Reports of the Unit Offices were reviewed in the OLIC Meetings and the reports of the review were communicated to the concerned offices so as to rectify their shortfalls in the Official Language implementation.

Hindi Workshop

- 7.20 In order to refresh the Officers of Headquarters on implementation of Official Language policy of the Union, Hindi workshop on Constitutional provisions of Official Language, O.L. Act, Rules and Resolutions and Annual Programme etc. was organized on 22.01.2019.
- 7.21 Hindi workshops were organized on 27.09.2018 and 28.09.2018 for the staff of the Headquarters on Functional Hindi. Three more workshops were organized for the staff of the Headquarters on 16.11.2018, 23.01.2019 and 15.02.2019.
- 7.22 Hindi Refresher Training programme and workshop was organized for the Officers and the staff in the Regional Offices, Chennai, Bengaluru, Guwahati and Patna and the State Centre, Pitapally.
- 7.23 An Awareness Programme in Hindi on Income tax Provisions was organized for the Officers and the staff of the Board on 19.12.2018.

Specific Measures taken for promotion of Official Language

- 7.24 First working day of every month is observed as Hindi Diwas and the Officers and the staff are encouraged to do more and more work in Hindi.
- 7.25 A Committee was constituted for the monitoring of implementation of Official Language policy and three meetings of the Committee were held and follow up actions were taken.
- 7.26 Four Sections viz. Meeting, Library, Finance and Technology were identified to do maximum work in Hindi/bilingually. In other Sections at least two to three subjects were identified for doing entire work in Hindi.
- 7.27 Monthly report is obtained from all the officials trained in computer so as to assess the quantum of work done by them in Hindi. These reports are reviewed in the OLIC Meetings and the Section Officers are requested to adopt necessary measures

for increasing the use of Hindi in computer in the Section. About 50% of the work in computer is done by most of them in Hindi.

- 7.28 Prizes were awarded to the Sections which wrote the "Aaj Ka Shabd" in the best manner during the period under report. Marketing and Administration Sections bagged the First and Second prizes respectively. Development and Statistics Sections shared the Third Prize.
- 7.29 Prizes were awarded to the Sections which had done maximum work in Hindi. Finance, Administration bagged the First and Second prizes respectively. Publicity and Meeting Sections shared the Third Prize.
- 7.30 Prizes were awarded to Smt P. Nimisha, LDC, Shri Supriya Guha, PS to Chairman and Smt. P.C. Hyrooneesa, LDC for doing maximum work in Hindi during the Hindi Fortnight.

Hindi Fortnight Celebration

7.31 Hindi Fortnight was celebrated in the Headquarters of the Board from 14th to 28th September 2018. The Fortnight celebration was formally inaugurated by Shri Saradindu Das, Chief Coconut Development Officer on 14th September 2018 in the Conference Hall of Kerabhavan by lighting the traditional lamp in the presence of Shri R. Madhu, Secretary, the Deputy Directors and the other Senior Officers of the Board. Appeal of the Chairman urging to do more and more work in Hindi was issued to the Officers and the staff of the Board. Competitions in Hindi were conducted for children of the Officers and the staff on 15th September 2018 at three levels i.e. Sub Junior, Junior and Senior. Competitions in Hindi Light Music, Dictation and Recitation were conducted for the Sub-Junior group and Hindi Light Music, Dictation, Recitation and Elocution for the Junior group. The topic of the Elocution competition was "Nariyal Ki Khoobiyan". For Senior group, competitions were conducted in Hindi Light Music, Recitation, Elocution and Essay writing. The topics of the Essay writing and Elocution competition were "Kudrat ka Vardaan Daab" and "Tvacha ki Suraksha mein Nariyal Tel hein Anootha" respectively. Various Hindi competitions such as Translation, Handwriting, Dictation, Recitation, Passage Reading, Light Music, Terminology, Noting and Drafting, Hindi Typing, Quiz,

Vartalap, Shabd Shakthi, and Anthakshari were conducted for the Officers and staff of the Board from 17th September onwards. Reading and Dictation competitions were held for Drivers and MTS on 24th September 2018.

7.32 The valedictory function of the Hindi Fortnight celebrations conducted on 16th October 2018 was chaired by Dr. Raju Narayana Swamy IAS, Chairman of the Board. On this auspicious occasion, Shri Kumar Pal Sharma, Deputy Director (Implementation), Regional Implementation Office, Kochi was the Guest of Honour. In his address, he briefed the significance of Hindi as Official Language and explained about the different new softwares like Speech note, etc. developed to facilitate the usage of Hindi in official work. He appreciated the Official Language activities of the Board.

7.33 Dr. Raju Narayana Swamy IAS, Chairman, CDB distributed the prizes to the winners of the Hindi essay writing competition conducted for Hindi teachers and school students of Ernakulam District and to the winners of the Hindi competitions conducted for the children of the employees of the Board. He also distributed the prizes to the children of the employees of the Board who scored highest marks in Hindi in their Tenth/ Twelfth standard examinations in State/CBSE/ISCE streams. Chief Guest of the function Shri Kumar Pal Sharma, Deputy Director (Implementation), Regional Implementation Office, Kochi distributed prizes to the winners of the Hindi competitions conducted for the staff of the Board.

7.34 Finance, Administration and Publicity Sections bagged First, Second and Third prizes for doing maximum work in Hindi. First and Second prizes to the Sections which wrote the "Aaj Ka Shabd" in the best manner were awarded to Administration and Publicity Sections respectively and Marketing and Technology sections shared the Third prize. Prizes were distributed to the staff who came First, Second and Third in doing maximum work in Hindi during the Hindi Fortnight. Shri R. Madhu, Secretary of the Board distributed prizes and certificates to the staff who participated in the incentive scheme for doing original work in Hindi and to the winners of team events conducted during Hindi Fortnight. Dr. Raju Narayana Swamy IAS, Chairman, CDB presented memento to the Guest of Honour.

- 7.35 In connection with Hindi Fortnight celebrations, Hindi Essay writing competition was conducted on the subject 'Ayurved mein Nariyal' for students in Senior and Junior categories and Hindi teachers of schools in Ernakulam district. 135 entries were received in the Senior category and 140 in the Junior category. 27 entries were received from the Hindi teachers.
- 7.36 In the Hindi essay writing competition, Kum. Komal Sharma (Class-10, Kendriya Vidyalaya, INS Dronacharya, Mundamveli, Kochi), Kum. Alisha M. Kurian (Class-10, Mar Basil HSS, Kothamangalam) and Kum. Gowthami Unnikrishnan (Class-8, Bhavans Adarsh Vidyalaya, Kakkanad) won First, Second and Third prizes respectively in the Senior category. Kum. Fatima Rasheed (Class-5, Green Valley Public School, Kothamangalam), Kum. Harshita Tiwari (Class 7, S.S.N.K.M Sharda Mandir, Lalan Road, Kochi) and Master Vishal (Class-6, Bhavans Varuna Vidyalaya, Thrikkakara) won First, Second and Third prizes respectively in the Junior category.
- 7.37 In the Hindi essay writing competition conducted for Hindi teachers of the schools in Ernakulam District, Smt. Margret George, Nirmala Higher Secondary School, Aluva, Shri E. Rajesh Menon, Bhavans Vidyamandir, Eroor and Smt. K.J Jobreena, Government High School, Elamakkara, Ernakulam won First, Second and Third prizes respectively.
- 7.38 In connection with the Hindi Fortnight celebrations, the Board sponsored a Hindi Quiz competition organized by Nirmala College, Muvattupuzha.
- 7.39 Hindi Day/Fortnight was celebrated in all the Regional Offices, State Centres, DSP Farms and MDIC, Delhi.

Town Official Language Implementation Committee

- 7.40 The Board attended the meeting of Kochi TOLIC twice during the year under report and follow up actions were taken.
- 7.41 The Board achieved the First prize for the best implementation of Official Language Policy of the Union among public sector undertakings having less than 100 staff constituted by Kochi TOLIC.

7.42 Smt. P. Nimisha, LDC got Third prize in the Hindi typing competition conducted by Kochi TOLIC during the Joint Hindi Fortnight celebrations.

Hindi Training

- 7.43 One LDC and one MTS of Headquarters, Kochi are undergoing training in the Hindi Typing correspondence course under the Hindi Teaching Scheme.
- 7.44 One Technical Officer and one LDC of DSP Farm, Pitapally passed the Pragya course under the Hindi Teaching Scheme.
- 7.45 One LDC of Regional Office, Chennai passed the Praveen course under the Hindi Teaching Scheme.
- 7.46 One MTS of DSP Farm, Palghar passed the Hindi Typing correspondence course under the Hindi Teaching Scheme.

Monitoring and Inspection



COCONUT DEVELOPMENT BOARD, KOCHI-11 Significant Accounting Policies Disclosed

The following are the significant accounting policies adopted by the Board in preparing the final accounts for the year 2018-19:

1. AS 2 'Accounting for Inventories'

Closing Stock/Inventory has to be either valued at cost or at net realizable value whichever is less. Since the Board is maintaining the stock/ inventories on breakeven basis, the same is valued at cost price and disclosed accordingly.

2. AS 10 'Property, Plant and Equipment'

The Board adopting rate of depreciation as provided in Income Tax Rules, 1962 and the rates of depreciation provided to the various assets are as under:

Asset costing Rs.10,000/- and above have been capitalized.

AS 12 'Accounting for Government Grants'

Government Grant received by an enterprise has to be recognized only when there is a reasonable assurance that the enterprise will comply with the conditions attached to the grant. The Grant from Government is in the nature of income to the Board. The Board has complied with the conditions stipulated for which the Grant has been released.

4. AS 15 'Accounting of Retirement Benefits in the Financial Statements'

Provision for liability towards Gratuity and Accumulated Leave Encashment needs to be accounted up to the year end on Actuarial basis. Since the Board has not conducted actuarial valuation of liabilities for Gratuity and Accumulated Leave Encashment, no such provision has been made in the books of accounts as on 31.03.2019, as envisaged in AS 15.

- 5. The Board is not maintaining Non Plan Schemes. The establishment expenses of the Board are met from Plan Head.
- 6. The figures for previous year are re-grouped and rearranged, wherever necessary to suit current year layout.
- 7. The Board follows accrual basis of accounting in preparing books of accounts. But the insurance for vehicles and AMC for computers are accounted on cash basis.
- 8. GPF of the Board has been set up by a notification dated 21.09.1992 by the Department of Agriculture and Cooperation, Govt. of India and has been published in the Gazette of India and Part II Section 3 Sub Section (ii) on 3.10.1992. Detailed guidelines have prescribed in the notification and the Board is following the above guidelines. Hence no separate approval has been obtained from Income Tax Department.

COCONUT DEVELOPMENT BOARD, KOCHI-11 Notes to and forming part of the Accounts for the year 2018-19

- 1. The Coconut Development Board is an autonomous body under the Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare, Government of India enacted by Parliament under Section 5 of the Coconut Development Board Act of 1979. The Board is fully funded by Government of India through Grants-in-aid and is not engaged in any trading activity and no tax on income is paid on its surplus. The surplus funds are either adjusted against Grants-in-aid or utilized for implementation of the approved schemes of the Board with the prior approval of the Government of India.
- 2. As per MIDH guidelines, the budgetary support for the Board's existing Demonstration cum Seed Production Farms is Rs.27.00 lakh whereas support for new Farms, the support is Rs.25.00 lakh per annum. The balance amount of the expenses of the DSP Farms is being met from the receipts of the Board.
- 3. During the current year, expenditure were met by the DSP Farms from Grant-in-aid and the receipts of the Board as detailed hereunder:

During the year, the Board received an amount of Rs.264.40 crores (Rs.196.00 crores in 2017-18) as Grants-in-aid (Rs.182.40 crores for regular schemes and Rs.82.00 crores as Special assistance for Government of Tamilnadu to mitigate the losses incurred for coconut palms due to the recent Gaja Cyclone) from the Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Government of India. In addition to this the Government of India permitted the Board to utilize the unspent balance available as on 1.04.2018 amounting to Rs.10.43 crores. The expenditure of the Board during the year 2018-19 is Rs.277.77 crores (Rs.189.86 crores in 2017-18).

5. The Unspent Grant-in-aid available with the Board as on 01.04.2018 was Rs.10.43 crores of which Rs.5.94 crores was under SCP Plan, Rs.0.46 crores was under Tribal Sub Plan and Rs.4.03 crores under General Schemes. During the year 2018-19, the Grant in aid received from Government of India was Rs.264.40 crores of which Rs.194.18 crores was for General Schemes, Rs.47.31 crores for Scheduled Caste Plan and Rs.22.91 crores for Tribal Sub Plan. The expenditure of the Board during the year was Rs.277.77 crores of which Rs.201.19 crores was for General Schemes, Rs.53.10 crores under Scheduled Caste Plan and Rs.23.48 crores under Tribal Sub Plan.

In addition to the above during the year 2018-19 an amount of Rs.1.94 crores under General Schemes, Rs.4.19 crores under Scheduled Caste Plan and Rs.3.27 crores under Tribal Sub Plan was also realized from various State Governments and other agencies as Unspent Grant-in-aid. Out of the above unspent Grant-in-aid, Rs.1.94 crores under General Schemes and Rs.0.11 crores under TSP schemes are utilized during the year. There was a savings of Rs.0.15 crores under SCP Plan during the year. The Unspent Grant in available with the Board as on 31.03.2019 was Rs.7.50 crores (Rs.3.15 crores under SCP and Rs.4.35 crores under TSP).

The Board is implementing various schemes such as Establishment of DSP Farms, Information and Information Technology, Expansion of Area under Coconut, Technology Demonstration, Market Promotion and Statistics, Technology Mission on Coconut, Technical Services, Coconut Palm Insurance Scheme, Kera Suraksha Insurance Scheme directly. The Scheme "Integrated Farming, Replanting & Rejuvenation of Coconut Gardens and Regional Coconut Nursery", are being implemented through various State Governments and the Board directly.

6. The Head Office building at Kochi, Regional Office building at Bengaluru and Patna the buildings at various DSP Farms are constructed on lands leased by the Government of India (for HO building) and State Governments (for Regional Office, Bangalore, Patna and all DSP Farms buildings). However the Pilot Testing Plant of the Board at Vazhakulam in Kerala State is constructed on a land owned by the Board (the title deed of the same is yet to be executed). The Board is also owned a Technology/Information/Training Centre and Two Trainee Hostels at Guwahati freehold. The extent of leased land in possession of the Board at various DSP Farms is given below. (The Board established a new DSP Farm at Fulia, West Bengal during the year).

- 7. The Board is in possession of a stock of priced publications worth Rs.5,16,060/-, Coconut Seedlings worth Rs.14,83,822/-, Coconuts worth Rs.21,53,603/- and Neera and Neera Products worth Rs.24,937.50 as on 31.03.2019. The Stock is valued at cost price of the products.
- 8. The Area Expansion Programme account is maintained by the various unit offices of the Board. This account is compiled, extracted and incorporated from the figures depicted in the Trial Balances obtained from the respective Drawing and Disbursing Officers of these unit offices.
- 9. During the year, out of Rs.23.97 crores released/revalidated under the scheme 'Integrated Farming', the Board has received utilization certificates for an amount of Rs.1.68 crores from the State Governments. The State wise details of utilization are as under:

- 11. The Board had purchased laboratory equipments costing Rs.9.27 lakh on 14.07.2001 for its Technology Development Centre, Vazhakkulam, Aluva from M/s. Pelican Bio Innovations (Pvt.) Ltd., Chennai. Since the equipments were found defective, the equipments were sent back to the supplier on 28.01.2002 for repair and the same was not returned to the Board till date. A case was filed by the Board before the Principal Sub Court, North Paravur, Ernakulam and subsequently was decreed in favour of the Board with a direction to the supplier M/s. Pelican Bio Innovations (Pvt.) Ltd., Chennai to refund an amount of Rs.13.54 lakh together with 6% interest p.a. However the amount is still pending realization.

Reason for Excess

 Establishment of Regional Coconut Nurseries including DSP Farm Nurseries

The expenditure under the commercial nursery attached to the DSP Farms of the Board also included under the scheme.

2. <u>Technology Mission on Coconut</u>

The scheme is being implemented on project basis and since more number of research projects were assisted under TMoC during the year and hence the excess expenditure.

3. Replanting and Rejuvenation of Coconut Gardens

Additional allocation for the States of Kerala, Karnataka, Tamilnadu and Andhra Pradesh were considered due to natural calamities during the year. Hence, excess expenditure has been incurred.

4. <u>Special Assistance for Gaja Cyclone, Tamilnadu</u>

Additional allocation under Replanting and Rejuvenation for Tamilnadu of Rs.1000.163 lakh has been rebooked under 'Special Assistance for Gaja Cyclone' as per directions from Ministry.

Reason for Savings

1. <u>Information & Information Technology</u>

Due to declaration of election code of conduct all programmes related to publicity and extension activities were cancelled.

2. <u>DSP Farms</u>

As the construction and developmental activities planned for the farms could not be taken up during the year, the fund remained as unutilized.

3. Establishment of Nurseries and Seed Gardens

The savings was due to non receipt of sufficient number of eligible applications under the scheme.

4. Expansion of Area under Coconut

The scheme with higher cost norms in NE States approved in the Action Plan for 2018-19 was not implemented as instructed by the Ministry.

5. <u>Integrated Farming</u>

Due to non-availability of sufficient beneficiaries under SC/ST categories, non-congenial season for implementation on identification of beneficiaries, the full amount could not be utilized during the year.

6. <u>Technology Demonstration</u>

Expenditure incurred by the pilot testing plants at CIT, Aluva and TDC, Guwahati was low and hence the savings.

7. Market Promotion & Statistics

About 7 new schemes were introduced during the year 2018-19 as part of Market Promotion and it took time for the popularization of the scheme. Apart from this participation by Board in international conferences facilitating participation of FPOs also could not be materialized.

8. <u>Infrastructure</u>, Administration & Technical Services

Infrastructure development proposed at the new DSP Farms, Fulia and Palghar could not be materialized during the year and hence the savings.

9. Coconut Palm Insurance

Administrative approval for implementation of the scheme was not received from Kerala and NE states. The scheme could not be implemented in UT of Lakshadweep as the approval was received by the fag end of the year.

10. Kera Suraksha Insurance

The shortfall in insurance is mainly due to non achievement under FoCT in full.

11. Centre of Excellence for Coconut

The provisions made in budget 2018-19 could not be utilized due to the reason that the project was not approved by the Ministry as it is not a scheme of CDB. The Ministry directed the Board to go ahead with infrastructure development following green protocol guideline.

Subject No.8: Annual Action Plan 2019-20 for Coconut Development Board Schemes under MIDH at a total budget of ₹21200 lakh

The Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare, Government of India vide letter No.F.33-6/2019-MIDH dated 29.03.2019, F.18-3/2019-MIDH dated 30.04.2019 and F.4-24/2019-MIDH (CDB & NHB) dated 10.05.2019 has conveyed the administrative approval for implementation of the Coconut Development Board Schemes under Mission for Integrated Development of Horticulture (MIDH) for the year 2019-20 with an allocation of a total amount of ₹21200 lakh with 100% Central assistance. The Ministry has directed to ensure the compulsory earmarking of 10% of allocation for North-Eastern States, 16.6% for Scheduled Caste Sub-Plan (SCSP) and 8.6% under Tribal Sub-Plan (TSP).

Accordingly, a tentative Annual Action Plan 2019-20 for CDB schemes amounting to ₹21200 lakh has been prepared and forwarded to the Ministry. The Ministry vide letter F.33-67/2017-MIDH (AAP) dated 6.06.2019 has approved the Annual Action Plan with an outlay of ₹21190 lakh.

Meanwhile the State wise and Scheme wise allocations have been drafted based on the SCSP (8.42%) and TSP (6.73%) allocations decided in the Executive Committee Meeting of the MIDH held on 13.03.2019 and 5% allocation of budget for North-Eastern States, as per the approval obtained from the Ministry vide letter F.4-12/2019-MIDH (CDB) dated 25.03.2019 considering the lesser area of cultivation and productivity in NE States.

Accordingly an Action Plan for ₹21190 lakh for 2019-20 with 12.80% under SCSP and 7.67% under TSP, with 5% allocation for North-Eastern States has been prepared.

The Action Plan for 2019-20 indicating the Scheme wise allocation for a total amount of ₹21190 lakh, with State wise allocations for field oriented schemes is placed below for kind perusal and ratification of the Board.

Subject No.9: Sanction of additional fund to Gaja affected area in Tamilnadu from the savings under various schemes for SCSP category – Ratification

Board had received a proposal under "Replanting and Rejuvenation of Coconut Gardens" for SC farmers of Gaja affected area from the Government of Tamilnadu at a total amount of Rs.1342.50 lakh. Considering the emergent nature and as per the instructions from the Chairman, CDB the proposal submitted by the Government of Tamilnadu was processed to extend additional allocation under R&R as per the components, cost norms and pattern of assistance approved by the Ministry for R&R scheme. Since the proposal was specifically for SC farmers and in the 134th Board Meeting, the Board observed that diversion of funds from SCSP cannot be allowed under any circumstances and to ensure 100% utilization of the funds earmarked therein by strictly following the guidelines, the overall savings under SCSP category were ascertained to utilize the same for this purpose. The additional allocation was met from the savings under different component schemes of the Board. The Board received the State Level Administrative Approval for Rs.1342.50 lakh vide G.O.(Ms) No.33 Agriculture (H2) Department dated 4.02.2019.

The total amount of Rs.1342.50 lakh has been reallocated as above and released to the Government of Tamilnadu on 9.01.2019 as per the directions of Chairman, CDB under the scheme "Replanting and Rejuvenation" as per the components, cost norms and pattern of assistance approved by the Ministry.

The Board may kindly ratify the action taken.

Subject No.10: Construction of Farmers Training Centre cum Administrative Building at DSP Farm, Hichachara, Tripura - Ratification

Coconut Development Board has established a Demonstration cum Seed Production Farm at Hichachara, Tripura. The land for the Farm, measuring 22 ha, was provided by the Government of Tripura for a period of 20 years on lease basis. The lease is extendable on review of positive performance. Farm officials were appointed and farm activities started in a rented building.

During the month of February 2019 the then Chairman visited the office of Chief Engineer, CPWD, Agartala and discussed the matter pertaining to construction of Farmers Training Centre cum Administrative building, Staff quarters, and providing LED street light along the Farm road at DSP Farm, Hichachara. Based on the Board's request CPWD, Agartala inspected the site as a prelude to draw the plan and estimate. After inspection, they had submitted an estimate for construction of Farmers Training Centre cum Administrative building costing Rs.7,57,27,500/-, Staff quarters costing Rs.2,92,47,900/- and Rs.5,31,821/- for providing LED street light in the existing electric poles along the Farm road. Accordingly as per the instruction of the Ex-Chairman an MOU was signed with CPWD, Agartala. However fund was not released to CPWD, Agartala.

In the meantime the present Chairman joined the Board and observed that the present requirements may be confined to a small administrative building-cum-training hall, for the time being, and construction of Quarters and Farmer Accommodation could be considered subsequently. Accordingly it was decided to carry out the construction of Farmers Training Centre cum Administrative building with an area of 450 sq.mtr consisting two floors as per the Preliminary Estimate submitted by CPWD during the month of December 2018. The Preliminary Estimate including contingencies to undertake the above work by CPWD is Rs.2,51,36,200/- (Rupees Two crores fifty one lakh thirty six thousand and two hundred only). A copy of the estimate is annexed.

Since the Board Meeting could not be conducted during the month of March 2019 due to model code of conduct in connection with the Parliament Election, approval of the Chairman was communicated to CPWD, Agartala to undertake the work and fund of Rs.2,51,36,200/- (Rupees Two crores fifty one lakh thirty six thousand and two hundred only) was released to CPWD.

Board may kindly consider the proposal and ratify the decision taken by the Chairman in the best interest of the Board.

Subject No.11: Proposal for maintenance and interior painting of office building of Coconut Development Board, Regional Office, Guwahati, Assam - Ratification

The Regional Office of the Coconut Development Board at Guwahati, Assam functions in the building owned by the Board which was purchased from the Assam State Co-operative Housing Federation Ltd. (Housefed), Govt. of Assam during 2000-01. The total area of the building is 4200 sq.ft.

The Chief Engineer, PWD (Building), Government of Assam inspected the building on the Board's request on 22.01.2019. After physical verification of the building he has stated that the provision for MS Grill in the Anodized Aluminum windows is essential for safety and security of the office complex. The interior wall painting has been found deteriorated. Based on the recommendation of Chief Engineer, PWD (Building), Government of Assam an estimate was obtained from Assam State Co-operative Housing Federation Ltd. (HOUSEFED), who had actually constructed this building. The estimate for providing, fitting and fixing of M.S. Grill and interior painting work for the building of Coconut Development Board, Regional Office, Housefed Complex, Guwahati comes to Rs.2,33,360/- (Rupees Two lakh thirty three thousand three hundred and sixty only).

Considering the safety and security of the staff and proper maintenance of the office building, action has already been initiated to undertake the work at a total cost of Rs.2,33,360/-.

The Board may kindly ratify the decision taken on the matter.

Subject No.12: Replacement of office vehicle at State Centre, Thane, Maharashtra

The office vehicle stationed at Thane is more than 20 years old and requires frequent repairs. During the month of October 2018 the registration of the vehicle was over and on inspection by RTO it was suggested to condemn the vehicle as it is not fit for plying on the road. The vehicle was purchased during 1998 at Chennai and was transferred to Thane during 2012. The condition of the vehicle is extremely bad and its frequent brake down during short as well as long journey is affecting day to day functioning of office. They are facing lot of problems while undertaking field visits due to frequent brake down. Details of the vehicle are as follows:

The repair of vehicle will incur huge amount and it will not be economical. Moreover, the vehicle fulfills the norms for condemnation.

For condemnation of motor vehicle, Delegation of Financial Powers Rule 13, Schedule VII states, "Motor vehicles fitted with engines up to 20 hp (RAC) 1.50 lakh KMs or 6½ years whichever is reached later".

As per order No.7(2)/E.Coord/2013 dated 18th September 2013 issued by the Secretary (Finance), Ministry of Finance, Department of Expenditure, New Delhi, new vehicles can be purchased against condemned vehicles. Therefore, Board may consider and approve the proposal to condemn the above mentioned vehicle and to replace with a new vehicle at a total cost not exceeding Rs.12.00 lakh (Rupees Twelve lakh only), provided the purchase is done through GEM after observing all codal formalities.

Subject No.13: Replacement of Farm Tractor at DSP Farm, Mandya, Karnataka

The Tractor stationed at DSP Farm, Mandya is 20 years old and requires frequent repairs. The said Tractor was purchased during 1999. The condition of the Tractor is extremely bad and repairing this tractor is not at all economical. Hence the day to day functioning of the farm is affected. Details of the vehicle are as follows:

For condemnation of motor vehicle, Delegation of Financial Powers Rule 13, Schedule VII states; "The life of a Tractor shall be taken as 10,000 hours or 10 years whichever is reached later".

As per rules the Tractor has to cover another 222.2 hours for its condemnation. But repairing of the tractor is not at all economical. Hence, Board may condone the provision under running hours as the Tractor is 20 years old.

As per Order No.7(2)/E.Coord/2013 dated 18.09.2013 issued by the Secretary (Finance), Ministry of Finance, Department of Expenditure, New Delhi, new vehicles

can be purchased against condemned vehicles. Board may consider and approve the proposal to condemn the above mentioned Tractor and to replace with a new Tractor at a total cost not exceeding Rs.6.00 lakh (Rupees Six lakh only).

Since the Tractor was urgently required for the smooth functioning of the Farm, action to purchase the same through GEM as well as disposal of old tractor has already been initiated. The Board may kindly ratify the action taken by the Chairman in the best interest of the Board.

Subject No.14: Purchase of "Integrated Attendance Device Type-1, Integrated android tablet and single Finger print scanner device housed in rugged casing"

As per the instruction received from the Ministry of Agriculture & Farmers Welfare, Government of India, New Delhi, Aadhaar enabled Biometric Attendance system is being used in all the offices of the Coconut Development Board to mark the attendance. The USB based Finger print scanner device for use with Desktop model Startek FM 220 was purchased during 2015 and was installed in all unit offices. This is an old device and it is found that the NIC prescribed RD Software is not available in these devices. Moreover, to sign the attendance through this system, the computer has to be logged in first. The system installed in all unit offices is old type. Many unit offices are complaining that desktop device is giving frequent troubles and not working properly.

On enquiry officials of NIC informed that they upgrade the software of Aadhaar Based Attendance System (ABAS) quite often. To overcome the present technical problem it is proposed to replace the old desktop system with "Integrated Attendance device Type-1, Integrated android tablet and single Finger print scanner device housed in rugged casing", which is now being used at Headquarters, Kochi. This device can be fixed at the entrance of the office and staff can register their attendance on arrival without logging on to the computer. The proposal was warranted due

to the fact that the present equipment installed in all unit offices was old AEBAS Desktop Fingerprint Scanner system which is not Wi-Fi enabled and updation of software was a problem. Software updation were occurring at a fast pace and hence the equipments become obsolete.

In the light of the above, it is proposed to purchase 22 nos. of new system viz. Integrated Attendance Device Type-1, Integrated android tablet and single Finger print scanner device housed in rugged casing for the installation in all the CDB unit offices. This may cost around Rs.12,000/- per unit. Thus total expected expenditure towards the purchase of 22 units is Rs.2.64 lakh. The purchase of the same will be effected only through GEM. Moreover, all unit offices will be requested to obtain Wi-Fi connection in their respective offices so that the attendance system can function well.

The Board may approve the proposal for the purchase of 22 numbers of "Integrated Attendance Device Type-1, Integrated android tablet and single finger print scanner device housed in rugged casing" at a total cost of Rs.2.64 lakh.

Subject No.15: Construction of Farmers Training Centre cum Administrative Building at DSP Farm, Dhali, Tamilnadu and ratification of transfer of fund to CPWD, Tamilnadu

Coconut Development Board has established a Demonstration cum Seed Production Farm at Dhali, Thirumoorthy Nagar, Udumalpet Taluk of Tiruppur District, Tamilnadu in the 40 ha land, handed over to the Board by the Government of Tamilnadu during 2014 on lease basis for a period of 33 years. Farm officials were appointed and farm activities have been started in a temporary building.

In the 51st APCC Session held at Kochi during 2nd to 5th February 2015, Government of India proposed for establishing a Centre of Excellence in Coconut. The Ministry has approved the allocation of Rs.3.00 Cr. during 2017-18 for establishment of Centre of Excellence. The matter was discussed in the 27th Meeting of the R&D Committee held on 4th October 2017 and in the 131st Meeting of the Board held on 6th October 2017. Certain clarifications were sought by the Board and Chairman, CDB was authorized to take up the issue with APCC and Ministry. Accordingly a detailed projected report at an estimated cost of Rs.14.90 Cr. was submitted to the MIDH on 24.01.2018. Pending approval, of the project, the CPWD was requested to submit the Preliminary Drawing and Estimate. The estimate submitted by CPWD was for Rs.9.90 Cr. To initiate action, an amount of Rs.3.00 Cr. was deposited with CPWD during March 2018. In the meanwhile APCC has conveyed that APCC cannot extend financial support for the proposed centre.

Since the CoE could not materialize during 2017-18, the advance amount of Rs.3.00 Cr. was re-allocated under Infrastructure & Development. During 2018-19 also, the Ministry has approved the allocation of Rs.3.00 Cr. for the establishment of Centre of Excellence. Since funding from APCC is not forthcoming, the CoE is to be approached in a phased manner. Accordingly the CPWD was requested to submit fresh drawing and estimate, limiting the expenditure to the Budget Approval by the Government of India, with the following specifications:

Based on the Board's request CPWD SZ-IV, Madurai inspected the site as a prelude to draw the plan and estimate. After inspection, they have submitted a plan having two floors in an area of 802.90 sq.mt (excluding the area of 29.79 sq.mt coming under the entrance porch). The Preliminary Estimate including contingencies to undertakeg the above work submitted by CPWD is Rs.3,04,76,000/- (Rupees Three crore four lakh and seventy six thousand only). A copy of the plan and estimate is annexed.

A proposal was placed before the Board in its 134th Meeting held on 25.10.2018 for ratification. The Board decided that Secretary, CDB would submit a detailed report to the Ministry narrating the entire facts and request

for a decision in this matter. Based on the report submitted by the Secretary, a meeting was held on 10.04.2019 under the Chairmanship of Shri Dinesh Kumar IAS, Joint Secretary (MIDH) to discuss about CDB's proposal for setting up of CoE at DSP Farm, Dhali, Tamilnadu in which Dr. B.N. Srinivasa Murthy, Horticulture Commissioner, Government of India, CCDO and officials of the Ministry were present. The minutes of the meeting was forwarded to Board's Secretariat vide OM No.4-5/2017-MIDH(CDB) dated 2.05.2019 directing the Board to take necessary action on the decision taken in the meeting held on 10.04.2019.

The following decision was taken in the meeting:

- (1) The proposal for Centre of Excellence is dropped. However, CDB can go ahead with the infrastructure development works including construction of Farmer's Training Centre cum Administrative Building.
- (2) The proposed building has to be developed with green protocol guidelines including bamboo and coconut wood particle boards.
- (3) The Chairman, CDB is authorized to take further actions regarding CoE.

Based on the decision taken by the Ministry to go ahead with the infrastructure development i.e. construction of Farmer's Training Centre cum Administrative Building CPWD was requested to submit a revised estimate incorporating the green technology provision. Based on the Board's request CPWD informed that the following generalized green measures are the inbuilt provisions in the preliminary estimate submitted. The plinth area rates adopted in the PE is inclusive of the provisions like

- (i) Over deck insulation and application of high reflective tiles on the roof.
- (ii) Masonry work in super structure fly ash block

- (iii) Windows with reflective gloss coating/high performance double glaze unit.
- (iv) Paint with low VOC option.
- (v) Rain water harvesting
- (vi) Replacement of conventional pillar cock with pillar cock with foam flow technology.
- (vii) CPWD requested to include the following electrical provision in addition to the PE already submitted under energy efficiency measures.
 - a) SITC of grid interactive roof top solar power 30,00,000.00 panel 30 kwp @ Rs.1,00,000 per kwp
 - b) Add 1% labour welfare cess 30,000.00
 - c) Add 4.25% towards ESI & EPF 1,27,500.00
 - d) Add 3% contingencies 90,000.00

Total - 32,47,500.00

Subject No.3: Extension and Publicity Activities 2019-20

Coconut Development Board has been carrying out various extension activities as part of creating awareness on scientific coconut cultivation and value addition among farmers, entrepreneurs, officials and stakeholders through various extension tools and multimedia product promotional campaigns for dissemination of information on the activities of the Board under the "Extension and Publicity Activities".

The proposed budget for the current financial year to carry out the Extension and Publicity Activities is ₹1250 lakh. Out of this, ₹678 lakh for carrying out the extension activities such as awareness programmes and skill development training programmes, sending bulk SMS to the farmers etc. and ₹572 lakh has been set apart provisionally for Publicity Activities and IT including committed liabilities.

Extension Activities

In order to create awareness on coconut and to extend scientific knowledge among farming community/stake holders/Agriculture/Horticulture Department officials, the Board is carrying out awareness cum training programmes across the country directly through State Department and also through Board's unit offices. It includes awareness seminar about the scientific cultivation technology, processing and value addition of coconut in state level, district level and block level, field level and interactive programmes. It also includes FPOs meetings, exposure visit of farmers inside and outside the State to study the best techniques in coconut cultivation and model farms. Block level programme and AEP programme are being carried

out through State Department. Besides the Board is imparting skill development training programmes viz. FoCT, Neera Technician training programme, Handicraft training programme, Quality planting material production through other organizations like CPCRI, Hybridization training/seedling production training and other training programmes.
